LEADER IN THE SHROPSHIRE HILLS UPDATE

Summary

This paper presents an update on the progress of the Shropshire Hills LEADER programme.

Recommendation

The Partnership is recommended to note progress and offer comments.

Background

- 1. The Shropshire Hills LEADER funding programme has issued its first Funding Contracts to successful applicants. The Contracts, approved by Shropshire Council's Legal Team, have been presented to the approved applicants for their consideration. Once the contracts have been signed projects can begin to draw down LEADER funding.
- 2. The Shropshire Hills LEADER programme has had approval that the preliminary claim, that covers the running costs of the programme, has now been paid. A further claim will be presented for payment at the end of January.
- 3. The LEADER Coordinator attends monthly regional update meetings and training sessions at Regeneration West Midlands. These monthly meetings are organised by Advantage West Midlands. A good working relationship is being developed with the other seven LEADER Local Action Groups throughout the West Midlands.
- 4. The LEADER Coordinator has engaged with 26 organisations that are at different stages of the LEADER process. There remains a strong interest in LEADER funding throughout the Shropshire Hills area. A Business Plan that explains the mechanics of LEADER and sets out the strategic aims and objectives for a twelve month period will be presented for the new Financial Year. This Plan will be made available to members. In conjunction with the Local Development Strategy the plan will assist the LEADER Approvals Panel in their task of awarding grants to applicants.
- 5. The Approvals Panel met on Thursday 17th December 2009 and approved one project, outlined in Appendix 1.
- 6. The following Expression of Interest Forms have been received. Applicants are working with the LEADER Co-ordinator to develop to full application:

 - Caring For God's Acre Sacred spaces through the ages

- Bishop's Castle Heritage Centre Chronicles of the Shropshire Hills
