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UPDATE AND PROGRESS REPORT ON AONB MANAGEMENT PLAN ACTIONS

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Summary

This paper presents a draft of the annual update of the Management Plan Actions, for comment and endorsement.

Recommendation

The Partnership is recommended to provide comments on the draft, and endorse it for publication.

Background

The Management Plan Actions have generally been updated every year. The gap this 1. time is slightly longer, since the publication of the Management Plan in May 2009. A progress column is included reporting against the Actions, and some Actions have been added or amended. Space does not allow reporting in fine detail, but comments members have will be very welcome on aspects of progress or other suggested changes to Actions (e.g. wording, partners, timescale, priority, etc). Good progress has been made overall, though future implementation of many Actions will depend on funding cuts and restructuring of public sector organisations.

Introduction

The Management Plan Actions is a prioritised delivery framework with a three to five year time horizon, reviewed annually on a rolling basis. For ease of updating it is printed separately to the rest of the Management Plan. There is a huge amount of activity in the area by a wide variety of parties which supports the objectives of the AONB Management Plan. The Management Plan Actions does not attempt to be comprehensive, but serves as a useful co-ordinating framework, drawing together those activities which are most significant in achieving the AONB's aims. Things which are already happening are included as well as new proposed or aspirational actions. The Management Plan itself is not a direct funding stream or single defined programme, and not all of the Actions are necessarily carried out with the AONB primarily in mind.

The lead responsibility for many of the Actions lies with organisations which are members of the Partnership, as well as with the Partnership itself. In some cases the inclusion in the Plan of an Action already being undertaken will highlight to those responsible its relevance to the AONB, and may allow adjustment or targeting of that activity to increase the benefit to the AONB. The way Actions are defined aims to balance a useful level of detail for those with a particular area of interest, with providing a reasonably accessible overview of work to support the Management Plan's aims. The Management Plan Actions provides a mechanism for reporting progress, and will be updated annually with progress reports and addition of new Actions.
