Annexes

Annex 1 – Mandatory Conditions

For the supply of alcohol

No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence -

- (a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
- (b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or their personal licence is suspended.

Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

Door Supervision

Where a premises licence includes a condition that at specified times one or more individuals must be at the premises to carry out a security activity, each such individual must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.

Mandatory Drinks Code Conditions

1. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.

(2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises—

(a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to—

(i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or,

(ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise); .

(b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;

(c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;

(d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;

(e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).

2. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.

3. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.

(2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.

(3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—

(a) a holographic mark, or

(b) an ultraviolet feature.

4. The responsible person must ensure that—

(a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises

(other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures— .

(i) beer or cider: ½ pint;

(ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and

(iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml.

(b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and

(c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

Mandatory Price Conditions

1. A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.

2. For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 1—

(a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;

(b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula—

$$P=D+(D \times V)$$

where—

(i) P is the permitted price,

(ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and

(iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;

(c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence—

(i) the holder of the premises licence,

(ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or

(iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;

(d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and

(e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.

3. Where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.

4.—(1) Paragraph 2 applies where the permitted price given by sub-paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.

(2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

Embedded Restrictions

Embedded Restrictions under the 1964 Licensing Laws

On-licences

Alcohol shall not be sold or supplied except during permitted hours. In this condition, permitted hours means:

a. On weekdays, other than Christmas Day, Good Friday or New Year's Eve, 11.00am to 11.00pm

b. On Sundays, other than Christmas Day or New Year's Eve, 12 noon to 10.30pm

c. On Good Friday, 12 noon to 10.30pm

d. On Christmas Day, 12 noon to 3.00pm and 7.00pm to 10.30pm

e. On New Year's Eve, except on a Sunday, 11.00.am to 11.00pm

f. On New Year's Eve on a Sunday, 12 noon to 10.30pm

g. On New Year's Eve from the end of permitted hours on New Year's Eve to the start of permitted hours on the following day (or, if there are no permitted hours on the following day, midnight on

31st December). UNLESS PROVISION HAS BEEN MADE TO CHANGE THESE RESTRICTIONS WHICH IS DETAILED IN THE CONDITIONS OF LICENCE ISSUED UNDER THE LICENSING ACT 2003

The above restrictions do not prohibit:

- a. During the first twenty minutes after the above hours the consumption of the alcohol on the premises
- b. During the first twenty minutes after the above hours, the taking of the alcohol from the premises unless the alcohol is supplied or taken in an open vessel
- c. During the first thirty minutes after the above hours the consumption of the alcohol on the premises by persons taking meals there if the alcohol was supplied for consumption as ancillary to the meals
- d. Consumption of the alcohol on the premises or the taking of sale or supply of alcohol to any person residing in the licensed premises
- e. The ordering of alcohol to be consumed off the premises, or the despatch by the vendor of the alcohol so ordered
- f. The sale of alcohol to a trader or club for the purposes of the trade or club
- g. The sale or supply of alcohol to any canteen or mess, being a canteen in which the sale or supply of alcohol is carried out under the authority of the Secretary of State or an authorised mess of members of Her Majesty's naval, military or air forces
- h. The taking of alcohol from the premises by a person residing there: or
- i. The supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to any private friends of a person residing there who are bona fide entertained by him/her at his/her own expense, or the consumption of alcohol by persons so supplied; or
- j. The supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to person employed there for the purposes of the business carried on by the holder of the licence, or consumption of liquor so supplied, if the liquor is supplied at the expense of their employer or of the person carrying on or in charge of the business on the premises

Credit Sales

Alcohol shall not be sold or supplied unless it is paid for before or at the time when it is sold or supplied, except alcohol sold or supplied:

- a. With and for consumption at a meal supplied at the same time, consumed with the meal and paid for together with the meal
- b. For consumption by a person residing in the premises or his guest and paid for together with his accommodation
- c. To a canteen or mess

No person under fourteen shall be in the bar during the permitted hours unless one of the following applies:

- a. He/she is the child of the holder of the premises licence
- b. He/she resides in the premises, but is not employed there
- c. He/she is in the bar solely for the purpose of passing to or from some part of the premises which is not a bar and to or from which there is no other convenient means of access or egress
- d. The bar is in premises constructed, fitted and intended to be used bona fide for any purpose to which the holding of the licence is ancillary

In this condition "bar" includes any place exclusively or mainly used for the consumption of intoxicating liquor. But an area is not a bar when it is usual for it to be, and it is, set apart for the service of table meals and alcohol is only sold or supplied to persons as an ancillary to their table meals.

Off-licences and off-sales departments of on-licensed premises Alcohol shall not be sold or supplied except during permitted hours. In this condition, permitted hours means:

- a. On weekdays, other than Christmas Day 8.00am to 11.00pm
- b. On Sundays, other than Christmas Day 10.00am to 10.30pm
- c. On Christmas Day 12.00 noon to 3.00pm and 7.00pm to 10.30pm
- d. On Good Friday 8.00am to 10.30pm

UNLESS PROVISION HAS BEEN MADE TO CHANGE THESE RESTRICTIONS WHICH IS DETAILED IN THE CONDITIONS OF LICENCE ISSUED UNDER THE LICENSING ACT 2003

The above restrictions do not prohibit:

- a. During the first twenty minutes after the above hours, the taking of the alcohol from the premises, unless the alcohol is supplied or taken in an open vessel
 - b The ordering of alcohol to be consumed off the premises or the despatch by the vendor of the alcohol so ordered
 - c The sale of alcohol to a trader or club for the purposes of the trade or club
 - d. The sale or supply of alcohol to any canteen or mess, being a canteen in which the sale or supply of alcohol is carried out under the authority of the Secretary of State or an authorised mess of members of Her Majesty's naval, military or air forces.
- Alcohol shall not be sold in an open container or be consumed in the licensed premises.

Annex 2 – Conditions consistent with the operating schedule

Prevention of Crime & Disorder

1. The premises will operate a zero tolerance policy concerning customers who present themselves in a Drunken or violent manner. In this event, patrons will be refused service and asked to leave.
2. Staff will be asked to maintain their own standards of behaviour.
3. Adequate staffing of the bar will be provided to help to avoid queuing where possible.
4. Glasses will be collected regularly from tables.
5. The music will be stopped 30 minutes before closing.
6. Known troublemakers will be banned in conjunction with the local pub watch scheme.
7. Patrons leaving the premises late at night will be asked to depart quietly. Public notices to this effect will be clearly displayed at all customer exits. A member of staff will always be present at exits 30 minutes prior to closing.
8. The George Hotel operates a Zero tolerance policy concerning Illegal Drugs, any patron suspected of being under the influence of illegal Drugs/or dealing will be reported to the police immediately. A notice to this effect will be posted in the bar area.
9. A 'Proof of age policy' is in force, and details are clearly posted in the bar serverly area.
- 10 Acceptable ID are: Passport; Driving Licence; HM Forces ID Card or those schemes as recommended by the local authority.
11. The applicant will remain a member of the L.V.A.
12. The premises is covered by the Local CCTV scheme.
13. Links are in place with Local Taxi firms, and a phone is available for customer use.

Public Safety

1. Evacuation procedures for customers (including disabled) are to be maintained, with all exits visibly marked and kept clear.
2. All curtains, hangings, decorations and upholstery are maintained, and are made of fire retardant material.
3. Fire action notices are to be contained within the bar area.
4. Staff are instructed to: keep all exits clear and unblocked; ashtrays will be emptied regularly into fireproof containers; all seating will be checked at closing time for cigarette ends; ventilation to be constantly monitored and controlled accordingly; and for special events private Door Management will be hired.
5. Direct access to be maintained for emergency vehicles.
6. A first aid kit is to be located behind the bar at all times.
7. The provision of male and female sanitation is to be constantly maintained.
8. An audit is to be reviewed providing provision for potential violent or threatening situations.
9. The premises will maintain its commercial ventilation.
10. An incident report book is to be maintained and available to all staff.

Prevention of Public Nuisance

1. The garden drinking area will close at dusk or 10pm, whichever is sooner.
2. Music volume will be controlled and turned off 30 minutes prior to closure.

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3. The premises will remain well insulated.
 4. Trade waste will not be placed in external bins after 9.00pm.
 5. Public notices will be placed on all exits asking customers to leave the premises quietly and in order.
 6. Customers who appear to be drunk and disorderly will be refused service.
 7. All external lights (not required for security) will be switched off after closing.
 8. Kitchen cooking filters will be changed regularly.
