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AONB TEAM WORK PROGRAMME AND BUDGET FOR 2018-19

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Summary

This paper provides the 2018-19 budget and work programme which formed the basis of our funding submission to Defra at the end of January. A request is also made for the first time for core funding contributions from organisations on the Partnership.

Recommendation

The Partnership is recommended to comment on the budget and work programme, and organisational members are requested where possible to seek a financial contribution towards the AONB core budget from their organisation.

Background

<u>Core funding contributions.</u> For some years now the combined local authorities' core contributions have been substantially below the 25% expected to match the Defra funding, leaving the Partnership with considerable targets of earned income to maintain basic core activities. While these targets have so far been met, the need to pursue earned income can sometimes be at the expense of other core work. The income target for the 2018-19 core budget is £42,425. The Transition Board in February therefore agreed a proposal that financial contributions into the core budget be requested from organisations on the AONB Partnership. The size and type of organisation represented varies enormously, so no suggested contribution is made, but contributions of any size will be gratefully appreciated. It is likely that this will be an ongoing request for support, but it is hoped that the organisations which are able to contribute will feel a greater buy in to AONB activity as funding partners. Possibilities are also being explored to develop relationships with Parish and Town Councils in the AONB to the extent that some of these may also feel able to contribute financially.

<u>Budget notes.</u> When the Defra bid was submitted, the extensions to the Landscape Partnership Scheme were not confirmed and so there are no budgets shown for this. There will in fact be costs in the first quarter of 2018-19 on the LPS. Overall, the finishing of the Scheme reduces our overall turnover by more than half. Developing new projects is proving to be slow work partly due to the time available, and work on the Management Plan review in 2018 will compound this.
