LSCB objectives (Section 14, Children Act 2004)

- (a) to coordinate what is done by each person or body represented on the Board for the purposes of safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children in the area; and
- (b) to ensure the effectiveness of what is done by each such person or body for those purposes.
- Seeking assurance
- Reviewing data
- Quality assurance activity
- Monitoring and evaluating effectiveness of training



Context

- 68,100 children under 19
- 13% children in income deprived households
- 2,305 referrals to children's social care
- 251 children subject of child protection plans
- 271 looked after children
- 480 (approx) children in care placed in Shropshire from elsewhere
- 2 serious case reviews
- Rising demands across system



Priorities

- 1. Compromised parenting (including domestic abuse, parental substance misuse, and parental mental ill health)
- 2. Missing children (including child sexual exploitation and trafficking)
- 3. Communication (including voice of the child)
- + developing and strengthening LSCB



Conclusions

- Agencies prioritise the safety and welfare of children and work constructively together
- Children generally receiving good service, despite increasing demands, but further improvements needed
- Good developments in early help but not yet consistent nor evidence of impact
- Evidence of impact of SSCB priorities
- Good focus of safety and training of children's workforce



Challenges

- Austerity avoiding unintended consequences
- Meeting increasing demands
- Improving consistency and reach of early help services
- Improving quality, consistency and accessibility of CAMHS across tiers
- Emotional wellbeing
- Capturing and reflecting children's voices
- Engaging adult services
- Evidencing impact



For the HWBB

- Leadership in co-ordinating multi-agency response to financial constraints
- Development of JSNA to provide evidence base for commissioning and planning (including for CSE)
- Promoting the significant role of adult services in safeguarding children
- Strengthening governance and 'read across' with LSCB
