1. Summary

In 2012/13 this Local Joint Committee has a total budget of £28,561 available to spend. This is made up of £24,500 from the LJC budget, £1,441 from the arts funding and £2,620 carryover from 2011/12.

The Committee have approved grants totalling £15,655 from the budget meaning there is **£10,284.50** remaining in the budget.

The basic grant criteria of the LJC is that projects can apply for grants of up to £500 without needing matched funding; or grants of between £501 and £2500 provided a minimum of 50% matched funding is secured. The maximum grant available from the LJC is £2,500.

Where matched funding is required for a project this must be in the form of cash, as in kind support is not accepted as matched funding.

BC 19.32	Four and Twenty Arts – Sticks and Stuff Environment Arts Club	<p>This is to provide a programme of Environmental Arts Club events led by local and guest professional Artists for 5-11yrs with their parents and an Environmental Arts Club for 11-16yrs. Each club will be held once a month for 12 months. The aim is to provide access to high quality hands-on participatory arts for young people. There will be an emphasis on creating art from natural and recycled materials inspired by the seasons and the local landscape. The participants will use all sorts of interesting materials; found, natural, and recycled objects. BC 19.33	Bishop's Castle Town Hall – Young Peoples Film and Drama Group	<p>Bishop's Castle Town Hall is about to start on a major renovation programme having secured funding from Heritage Lottery and a number of other sources.</p> <p>In addition to the capital renovation works we must deliver an extensive programme of activities that will engage as many people as possible in the heritage of the town and encourage them to participate in activities that will improve their knowledge, skills and understanding of local history and the building.</p> <p>A key part of our activity programme involves working with young people through links with the Community College, local primary schools and with SpArC.</p> <p>During the development phase of the HLF scheme in 2012 we appointed Drama specialists to work with college students and to put on a performance for local people and visitors to the Town Hall as part of the town's Arts Festival. A DVD is available for interest if required.</p> <p>This initial creative project was very well received by all that took part and by those that watched the performances. BC 19.34	Bishop's Castle Walking Festival – Promotion of 2013 festival	<p>To promote & organise the 3-day 2013 Bishops Castle Walking Festival. We will provide a variety of guided walks in South Shropshire & the Welsh borders close to Bishops Castle; and a programme of associated events for the general good of the local community.</p> <p>We always use coaches to transport guests to the drop-off and pick-up points, to reduce our carbon foot-print. This is so that guests have the option of using public transport to travel to Bishops Castle or can use their own cars to get to the town, but then do not need them for the duration of the festival. Wherever possible we try to offer several walks that either start or end in Bishops Castle, so that less travel is required. For 2013 we are to making a lot more use of local transport initiatives and have already agreed commitments from Dial-a-Ride in Bishops Castle and from Church Stretton Ring and Ride. (Our transport costs have been increasing year-on-year and were £1500 for 2012. We may also need to address issues of group leadership, general safe practice and basic first aid and emergency procedures. Being able to pass on their enthusiasm and knowledge to our guests will, hopefully encourage them to return again and again to South Shropshire.			
BC 19.35	Lentwardine and Bucknell Community First Responders – New Vehicle	Community First Responder Schemes are teams of volunteers who are recruited from within their local communities, and have a greater understanding of their local residents locations and are able then to access the isolated and remote areas more effectively. They are trained by the West Midlands Ambulance Service to a nationally recognised level and provide life saving treatment to people in their local communities. The Community First Responder must also complete training with ambulance crews and Community Paramedics before going live. Once on scene the Community First Responders will provide treatment as they have been trained to do until the nearest ambulance arrives. The types of calls generally attended are Cardiac Arrest, Heart Attack, Strokes, Choking, Diabetic and Traumatic Emergencies. 		<p>The Leintwardine & Bucknell Community First Responders are endeavouring to purchase a four wheel drive vehicle for responders operating in the locality. We currently utilise our own vehicles.</p> <p>Community First Responders (CFR's) must be able to respond at very short notice of a 999 call and in some instances the time frame required to be in attendance with a patient is crucial to their recovery, in the case of a Cardiac Arrest a time on scene requirement is four minutes, any additional minute after this can reduce life expectancy by 10%. Operating within the area of the Leintwardine & Bucknell roads can be very hazardous and in some instances require a four wheel drive vehicle to attend. Such vehicles would enable us to access the more remote and difficult areas and enable us to attend emergencies in inclement weather. It would also give us the advantage of a radio for more direct communication with ambulance control and a tracking facility. This would then link the car and the Responder directly to Ambulance Control which can expedite a rapid and accurate response to the patient's address removing the problem of poor mobile phone signals in remote locations within the south Shropshire area. BC 19.36	Bishop's Castle Town Twinning – 10 th Anniversary Celebration	It is to mark the 10 th anniversary of Bishop's Castle's "twinning" with St. Marcel, Normandy by introducing the people of St, Marcel and the surrounding villages to the culture of the English/Welsh border and the Shropshire Hills. Artists will be coming from France to join with local artists for a joint exhibition – the first one since the twinning ceremony in France in 2003 – in St. John's Church and art workshops led by guest artists. The visit will co- inside with Michaelmas Fair to give the visitors an insight into rural life past and present. Visits to the local museums and the world heritage site of Ironbridge will give the visitors an industrial and historical perspective of this area.
