DISCLOSABLE PECUNIARY INTERESTS

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Every Member¹ is required to register and disclose certain interests and those of their Partner² where they are aware of the existence of such interests.

⁴ "body in which the relevant person has a beneficial interest" means a firm in which you or your partner is a partner or a body corporate of which you or your partner is a director, or in the securities of which you or your partner has a beneficial interest; and "director" includes a member of the committee of management of an industrial and provident society

⁵ "land" excludes an easement, servitude, interest or right in or over land which does not carry with it a right for the relevant person (alone or jointly with another) to occupy the land or to receive income;

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<p><u>Corporate tenancies</u></p> <p>Any tenancy where (to your knowledge)— (a) the landlord is the Council ; and (b) the tenant is a body in which you or your partner has a beneficial interest.</p>	<p>None</p>
<p><u>Securities</u></p> <p>Any beneficial interest in securities⁶ of a body where— (a) that body (to your knowledge) has a place of business or land in the area of the Council ; and (b) either— (i) the total nominal value of the securities exceeds £25,000 or one hundredth of the total issued share capital of that body; or (ii) if the share capital of that body is of more than one class, the total nominal value of the shares of any one class in which you or your partner has a beneficial interest exceeds one hundredth of the total issued share capital of that class.</p>	<p>INVESTMENT WITH St James Place Wealth Management Partners at Anchorage Ave, Shrewsbury Business Park, SY2 6FG in excess of £25,000.</p>

NOTES ON SENSITIVE INTERESTS
