

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1. Summary of Findings

Case SH/042/008 was included in the research scope by Shropshire County Council as the route is present on the 1929 Handover Map but is not currently recorded on Shropshire County Council roads network / list of streets.

From the documents examined it is possible to establish that the case file route is shown on the Finance Act Survey map uncoloured and excluded from hereditaments. This suggests that the route was considered to be a public highway at the time of the Finance Act Survey, but does not in itself provide evidence about the class of rights that existed over it. Part of the length of the case file route is shown as a throughroute on a Deposited Railway plan and is further described as a "Lane" in the accompanying section.

Two Non-Ordnance Survey Commercial maps demonstrate evidence for the route. On one map (Greenwood's) the route is described under the heading "Cross Roads" in the map key. For the purposes of DLW research, the identification of a route as a cross road is taken as evidence of reputation of the route as a highway, but is not taken in itself to provide evidence of the class of these rights above that of a bridleway. The Ordnance Survey Records also support the existence of the route as a physical feature.

The Ordnance Survey 1" Revised New Series map demonstrates evidence for the route. The route is shown on the map and is described in the key under the heading "3rd Class Metalled Roads". For the purpose of the Discovering Lost Ways Project research it has been agreed that the showing of routes as 1st, 2nd or 3rd class metalled roads on OS 1" Revised New Series maps will be taken as evidence of the existence of public vehicular rights. It is considered therefore that a public vehicular right of way existed over the route at the time of the survey.

The evidence found meets the standards set out in Section 53 of the Wildlife & Countryside Act, 1981 that a public right of way subsists or is reasonably alleged to subsist and has therefore been categorised as "Strong", supporting the making of a definitive map modification order application to add the route to the Definitive Map.


2. Description of Route

The route begins at a junction with a public road (which has been given the reference U2099/190 on Shropshire County Council's List of Streets) at coordinate SJ7310 2762 (point A on the Case File Route Map). From this point it continues in an easterly direction before changing direction and heading northwards. The route joins with Bridleway 0204/20-1 just before its termination point (B). The route terminates at a junction with Hopshort Lane (which has been given the reference U3123/10 on Shropshire County Council's List of Streets) at coordinate SJ7334 2801 (point B on the Case File Route Map).


The route has a length of 575 metres.

During the research process, the whole of the case file reference number SH/042/008 was identified with the case route number T000998. Both references are used in section 6 of this report. Where documents are considered to contain relevant evidence the case route number is used (in bold). Where there is no evidence the case file reference number is used (plain text).


3. Location Plan

The route is observed to commence at the first junction north "Knighton" marked on the map. The route is described in a manner which fails to confer any indication of status, i.e. as "By-road" in the map key and is depicted as consisting of two parallel solid black lines. The route is observed to terminate after a short distance to the south west of "Soudley Park" on the map.






2. Ordnance Survey Surveyors Drawings, SHR 209, dated 1817, demonstrates evidence for part of route T000998. The route is observed to commence to the south east of "Soudley Park" marked on the map. The route is shown on the map and is depicted as consisting of two solid parallel black lines. The route is observed to terminate to the west of "Shawbroom" marked on the map.



3. Railway Plan, SHR DP/303, entitled "MAP or PLAN of an intended RAILWAY from or near to a STREET or ROAD called Islington in the PARISH of SAINT MARTIN in BIRMINGHAM in the County of Warwick to or near to the Royal Rock Ferry on the WESTERN SHORE of the RIVER MERSEY in the Township of HIGHER BEBINGTON...", dated November 29th 1825, demonstrates evidence for part of route T000998. The route is observed to commence at the south east corner of parcel number "11" on the plan. It shows the route specifically numbered on the plan, in this case number "9" and is depicted as consisting of two parallel solid black lines (in-filled). The route is shown as a through route and is labelled on the map as "To Soudley". The route is observed to terminate at the point marked "To Soudley" on the plan where the route continues beyond the extents of the mapped area.

Railway Section, SHR DP/303, entitled "SECTION of an intended RAILWAY from or near to a Street or Road called Islington in the Parish of Saint Martin in Birmingham in the County of Warwick to or near to the Royal Rock Ferry on the Western Shore of the River Mersey in the Township..", dated November 29th 1825, demonstrates evidence for part of route T000998. The route is described in a manner which fails to confer any indication of status, i.e. as a "Lane".

GREENWOOD.", dated 1827, demonstrates evidence for part of route T000998. The route is observed to commence to the north west of "Park Heath" marked on the map. The route is described under the heading "Cross Roads" in the map key and is depicted as consisting of two parallel solid black lines. The route is observed to terminate to the east of "Soudley Park" marked on the map






6. Ordnance Survey 1" Old Series, SHR Ordnance Survey Old Series 1": 1 mile, entitled "Folder 1 1833-35", dated 1833-35, demonstrates evidence for all of route T000998. The route is observed to commence at a road junction to the north east of "Park Heath" marked on the map. The route is shown on the map and is depicted as consisting of two parallel solid black lines. The route is observed to terminate just south of "Shawbroom" marked on the map.



7. Tithe Map, TNA IR 30/29/72, entitled "MAP OF THE TOWNSHIP OF GREAT SOUDLEY IN THE PARISH OF CHESWARDINE in five parts: part 3", dated 1840, demonstrates evidence for all of route T000998. The route is observed to commence at the north west corner of parcel number "633" on the map. The route is shown but is un-numbered and not within a numbered parcel and is depicted as consisting of two parallel solid black lines (in-filled). The route is observed to terminate at the north west corner of parcel number "669" on the map.








Ordnance Survey 25" 1st Edition, BL Vol 690 (4), entitled "Shropshire (Northern Division) Sheet XXIII.4 - Cheswardine & Hinstock Parishes", dated 1880, demonstrates evidence for all of route T000998. The route is observed to commence at the north west corner of parcel number "1113" on the map (shown on 30SJ7327). The route is depicted as consisting of two parallel solid black lines with a single black dashed line along the centre. The route is observed to change physical characteristics at the south east corner of parcel number "1080" on the map. From here the route is depicted as consisting of two parallel solid black lines. The route is observed to change physical characteristics again at the north east corner of parcel "1080". From here the route is shown specifically numbered on the map as "1083" and is depicted as consisting of two parallel solid black lines with a single black dashed line

along the centre. The route is observed to terminate at the south west corner of parcel number "1034" on the map (shown on 30SJ7328).



The route is observed to commence a point south of the "H" of "Hopshort". The route is shown on the map un-named and is described in the key under the heading "3rd Class Metalled Roads". The route is depicted as consisting of two parallel solid black lines. The route is observed to terminate a point south of the "s of "Hopshort".

13. Finance Act Survey Map, TNA IR 132/4/242, entitled "SHROPSHIRE SHEETS XXIII.4 & XXIV.1, STAFFORDSHIRE SHEETS XXVIII.15 & XXXV.3 (Parts of)", dated 1909/1910, demonstrates evidence for all of route T000998. The route is observed to commence at the north west corner of OS parcel number "918" on the map. The route is shown uncoloured and excluded from hereditaments and

is depicted as consisting of two parallel solid black lines. The route is observed to terminate at the south west corner of OS parcel number "892" on the map.



7. Interpretation of Evidence from Individual Records

Evidence of status:

This evidence concerns the existence of a public right of way. The ARU's research establishes whether a way is described as "public" or "private" and whether public rights can be inferred from other information provided within the documentary source. Evidence of status is categorised as follows:

Evidence of class:

Evidence of width:

This evidence relates to the legal width of the case file route – for example, legally defined widths (e.g. in Inclosure Awards).

There is no evidence to support a specific legal width for the route.

8. Overall Evaluation of Evidence

The evaluation of the evidence has been carried out in accordance with the Discovering Lost Ways Project's series of Research Standards (for specific references see Appendix A below).

Findings from the main documentary sources:

1. Tithe Survey Records

The Tithe Survey map demonstrates evidence for the route. The route is shown un-numbered and not within a numbered parcel therefore there is no evidence for the route in the corresponding apportionment.

2. Finance Act Survey Records

The Finance Act Survey map demonstrates evidence for the route. The route is shown uncoloured and excluded from hereditaments. This suggests that the route was considered to be a public highway at the time of the Finance Act survey, but does not in itself provide evidence about the class of rights that existed over it.

3. Deposited Railway Records

The Deposited Railway records demonstrate evidence for part of the route. The route is shown specifically numbered on the plan and is also shown as a through route. This is considered to provide evidence of the inference of public rights over the route. In addition, the Deposited Railway section describes the route in a manner which fails to confer any indication of status, i.e. as a "Lane".

4. Non-Ordnance Survey Commercial Mapping

One Non-Ordnance Survey Commercial map (Greenwood's) demonstrates evidence for part of the route. The route is shown on the map and described in the key under the heading "Cross Roads". For the purposes of DLW research, the identification of a route as a cross road is taken as evidence of reputation of the route as a highway, but is not taken in itself to provide evidence of the class of these rights above that of a bridleway. A further Non-Ordnance Survey Commercial map (Baugh's) demonstrates evidence for part of the route. The route is described in a manner which fails to confer any indication of status, i.e. as "By-road" in the map.

5. Ordnance Survey Records

a. Ordnance Survey 1" Old Series

The Ordnance Survey 1" Old Series map demonstrates evidence for the whole of the route as a physical feature only.

b. Ordnance Survey 25" 1st Edition

The Ordnance Survey 25" 1st Edition map demonstrates evidence for the route. The route is shown on the map and is specifically numbered but there is no evidence for the route in the associated book of reference.

c. Ordnance Survey 25" 2nd Edition

The Ordnance Survey 25" 2nd Edition map demonstrates evidence for the route. The route is shown on the map un-named therefore the object name book has not been examined.

d. Ordnance Survey 1" New Series

The Ordnance Survey 1" New Series map demonstrates evidence for the route. The route is shown on the map is described in the key under the heading "3rd Class Metalled Roads". For the purpose of the Discovering Lost Ways Project research it has been agreed that the showing of routes as 1st, 2nd or 3rd class metalled roads on OS 1" New Series maps will be taken as evidence of the existence of public vehicular rights. It is considered therefore that a public vehicular right of way existed over the route at the time of the survey.

Alignment of the case file route:

From the analysis of the early Non-Ordnance Survey Commercial maps and the Ordnance Survey Surveyor's Drawings against documents post-Ordnance Survey 1" Old Series it would appear that part of the length of the route was created as a consequence of the construction of the Shropshire Union canal. However, based on the analysis of documents post-Ordnance Survey 1" Old Series the alignment of the case file route has not changed when compared to modern Ordnance Survey maps.

Evidence of Width:

There is no evidence to support a specific legal width for the route.

Contradictory evidence:

No contradictory evidence was found for the route.

Outcome of the evaluation:

Case SH/042/008 was included in the research scope by Shropshire County Council as the route is present on 1929 Handover Map but is not currently recorded on Shropshire County Council roads network / list of streets.

From the documents examined it is possible to establish that the case file route is shown on the Finance Act Survey map uncoloured and excluded from hereditaments. This suggests that the route was considered to be a public highway at the time of the Finance Act Survey, but does not in itself provide evidence about the class of rights that existed over it. Part of the length of the case file route is shown as a throughroute on a Deposited Railway plan and is further described as a "Lane" in the accompanying section.

Two Non-Ordnance Survey Commercial maps demonstrate evidence for the route. On one map (Greenwood's) the route is described under the heading "Cross Roads" in the map key. For the purposes of DLW research, the identification of a route as a cross road is taken as evidence of reputation of the route as a highway, but is not taken in itself to provide evidence of the class of these rights above that of a bridleway. The Ordnance Survey Records also support the existence of the route as a physical feature.

The Ordnance Survey 1" Revised New Series map demonstrates evidence for the route. The route is shown on the map and is described in the key under the heading "3rd Class Metalled Roads". For the purpose of the Discovering Lost Ways Project research it has been agreed that the showing of routes as 1st, 2nd or 3rd class metalled roads on OS 1" Revised New Series maps will be taken as evidence of the existence of public vehicular rights. It is considered therefore that a public vehicular right of way existed over the route at the time of the survey.

The evidence found meets the standards set out in Section 53 of the Wildlife & Countryside Act, 1981 that a public right of way subsists or is reasonably alleged to subsist and has therefore been categorised as "Strong", supporting the making of a definitive map modification order application to add the route to the Definitive Map.
