

High Sheriff Awards





Jordan was honoured at this year's High Sheriff of Shropshire's Outstanding Young Citizen Awards. The 16-year-old received the Borough of Telford & Wrekin shield, as well as the area's senior winner's trophy, from High Sheriff of Shropshire, Mandy Thorn.

Jordan, who is profoundly deaf, is on the Prince's Trust programme which is designed to maximise young people's chances of moving into employment, education or training.

He said: "Before I came to Telford College I didn't enjoy my secondary education as much as I would like. Being profoundly deaf, my confidence in speaking and listening was very low.

"I was nervous on my first day in college, but when I given support in British Sign Language I could access all the curriculum had to offer.

"I am now feeling more confident within myself, talking in groups, contributing to lessons, making friends and on my learning journey.

"It is amazing, and I love it. I am so excited for my first year in art, and for where the rest of my learning journey will take me in my future."

For the last 18 months Jordan has also been volunteering as 'Mawley the Lawley Mole', a community mascot who attends local events in support of local projects. He has attended community safety events, festive celebrations, summer festivals, and the King's Coronation celebration.

He also teaches line dancing with his family at the Lawley Village Line Dance Club, encouraging people from his local area to meet new people, learn a new skills and have lots of fun.

Jonathan Abbott, one of Jordan's Telford College tutors, added: "Jordan is embracing all aspects of college life, both academic and social, with such enthusiasm. He has made huge strides already in his confidence, joining clubs, becoming an independent learner, and is exploring opportunities for further study in art. We are so proud of his approach and attitude to learning in this new environment and can't wait to see where his positive start in further education leads to."



A huge congratulations also goes to James who was nominated by his school for completing a 5k colour run for the Lingen Davies Cancer Fund. He raised a very impressive £209 for the charity.

Secondary school - A parents' perspective



Effie was born in China in 2012, and she was later diagnosed as profoundly deaf by the NHS in the UK. Although we speak as her parents, she is a shining example of what a deaf or hard of hearing child can achieve with the correct support framework. Effie is an incredibly bright, studious, emotional, cheeky, and fun girl on the edge of becoming a full-blown teenager.

The transition from primary school to secondary school is daunting for any child, but the worries and anxieties of any child with additional needs will always be magnified. The Transition Day was a wonderful way to settle and ease some of the nerves and manage Effie's expectations. As parents, we know that even with the best preparation, things don't always go to plan, and I think we were more apprehensive when her first day came. However, going to the Priory has been the best thing for Effie's development. It isn't a stretch to say that she loves it, and a great part of that is due to the support that she has been given by the teachers of the deaf and the preparation that the school was given by members of that team. I have to give a special mention to Theresa and Nicky as they have been truly wonderful.

Academically, Effie has shone. We have just had her first report, and it is excellent. But probably, as importantly to Effie, she has a great group of friends. She is happy both academically and socially. In terms of clubs and societies, she has never been particularly sporty, which hasn't been a problem as she has performed in both the musical concert and is currently in the production of Oliver as the dual role of fruit seller and street urchin!

The only thing we really wanted for Effie is to grow as a happy little girl who happens to wear cochlear implants rather than a girl who is defined by her cochlear implants. We know that there will be bumps in the road as she gets older. There always have been, but how is that different from the growth of any girl entering life as a teenager?

Nethan is in Year 1 at Church Aston Infants School. He is profoundly deaf and is a cochlear implant wearer. Nethan moved with his family from India in July 2022. His home language is Malayalam. I am extremely proud of Nethan's achievements as he has worked very hard to understand and learn English since moving to England. He has made accelerated progress which is very pleasing. He is keen to engage , has made many friends and has immersed himself in to the life of the school . He has received regular support from Nicky Clark (Social Inclusion Facilitator) to make a game based on Spiderman to support his turn taking , social cues and skills.




