What is a Joint Strategic Needs Assessment?

Local Authorities and CCGs (now ICS) have a legal Statutory Duty to undertake a Joint Strategic Needs Assessment (JSNA), through the health and wellbeing board.

The JSNA seeks to identify **current** and **future health and wellbeing** needs in the local population and identify strategic **priorities** to inform commissioning of services based on those needs.

These priorities in turn inform the **Health and Wellbeing Strategy** and **Integrated Care Strategy**, key documents as a basis for commissioning health and social care services in the local area. We also believe they should support local **partners/communities' priorities**.


In Shropshire, our JSNA takes three types:

- Web based profiling Tool
- Thematic Needs Assessments - e.g., pharmacy, drug and alcohol and children
- **Place Based Needs Assessments**

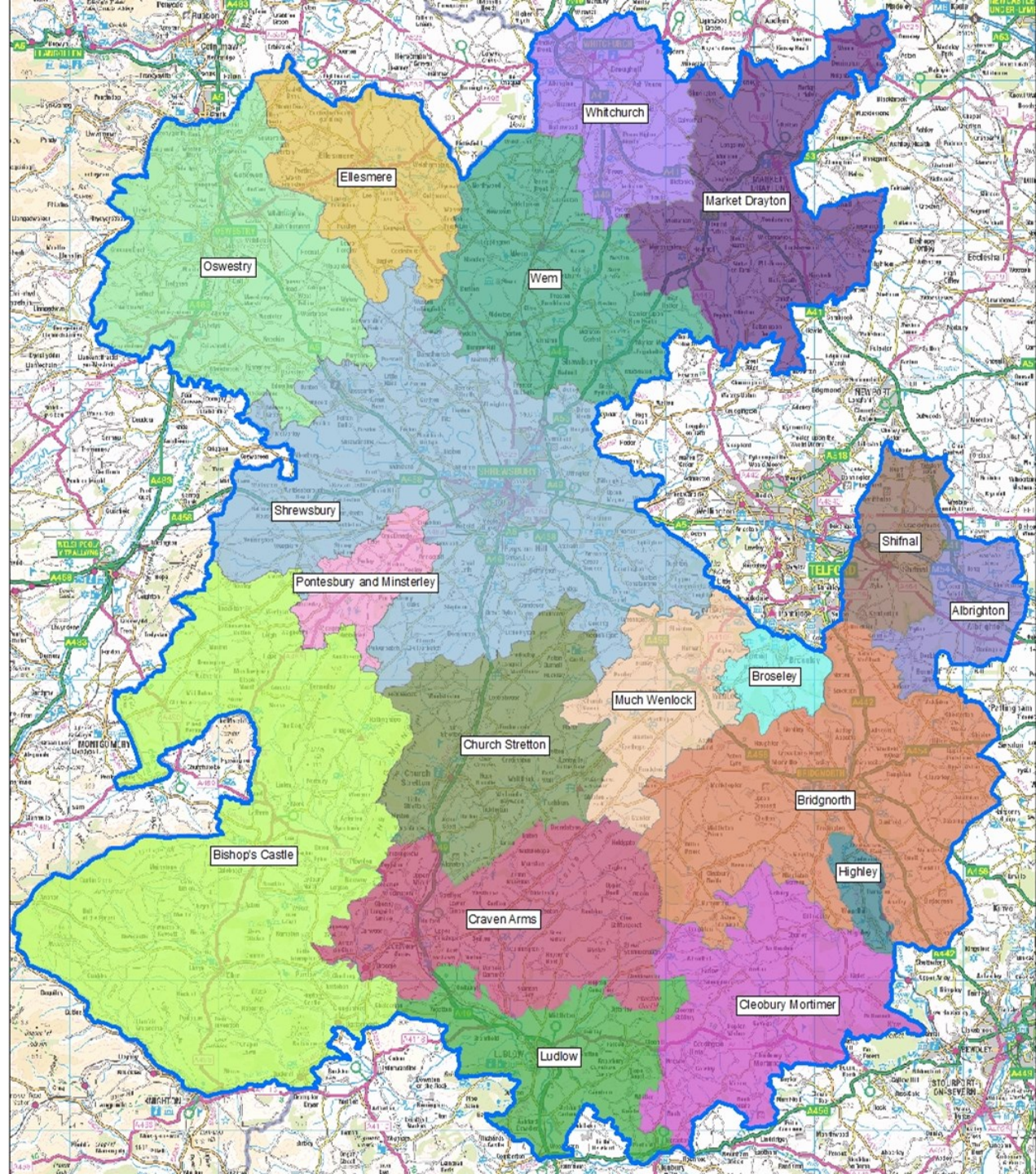

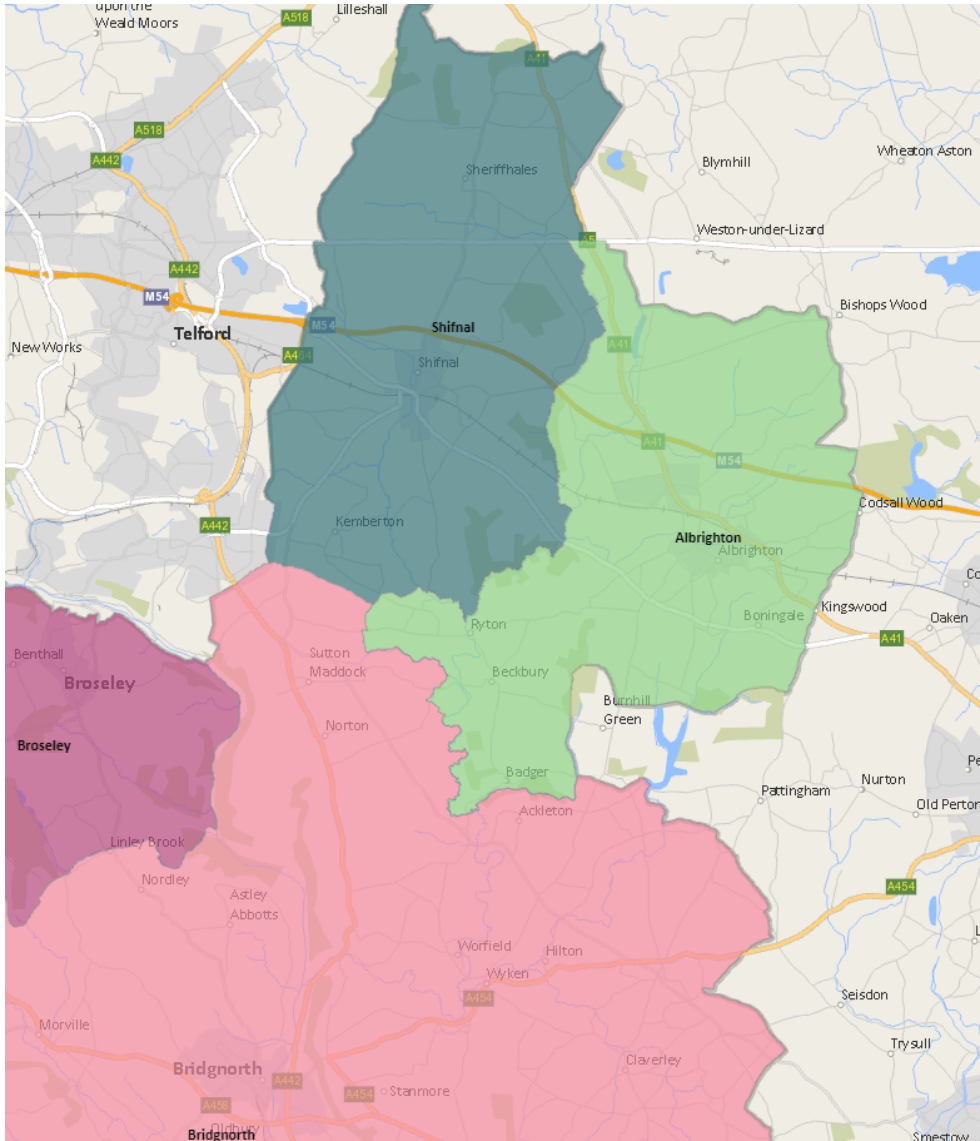

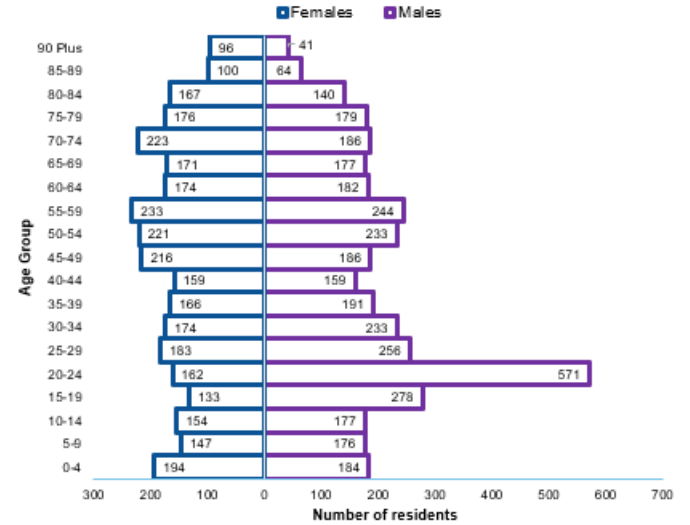




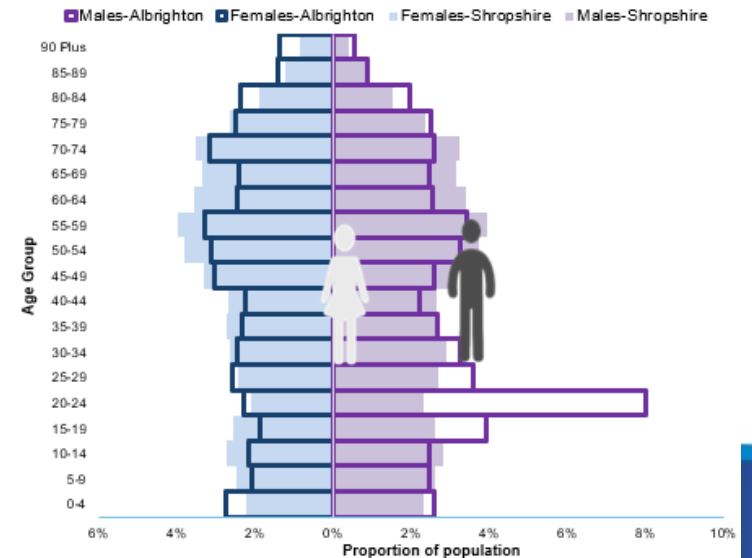
Albrighton Place Plan Area

Smoking at time of delivery

- Albrighton had 147 deliveries between 2017/18 and 2021/22, which is the 3rd lowest of the 18 place plan areas.
- However, the rate of smoking (6.1%) was the 2nd lowest place plan area, significantly lower than Shropshire's (10.7%)

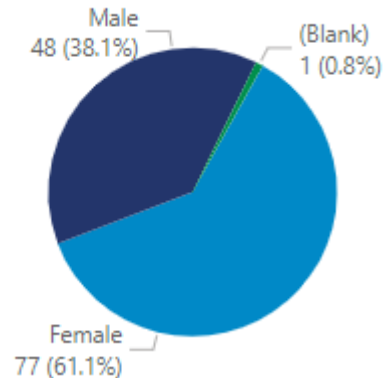
Community Engagement Survey Results

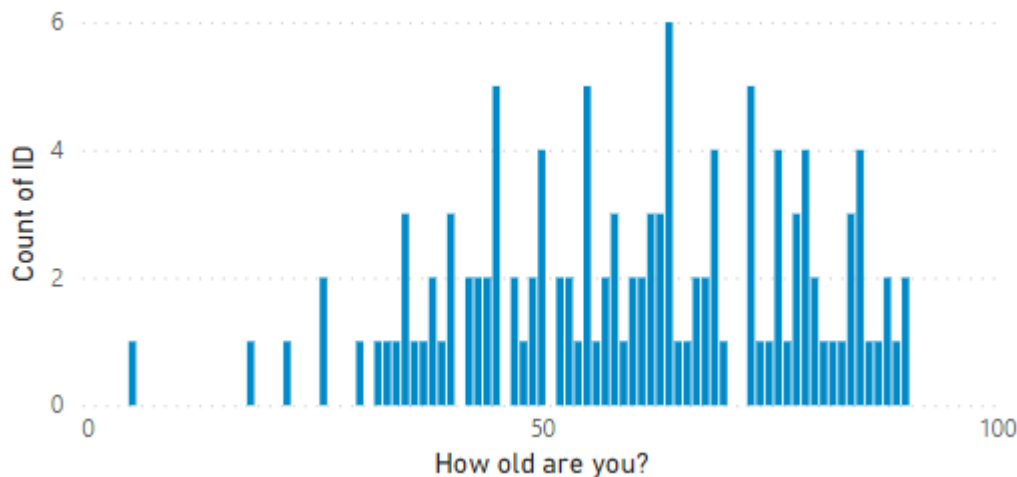

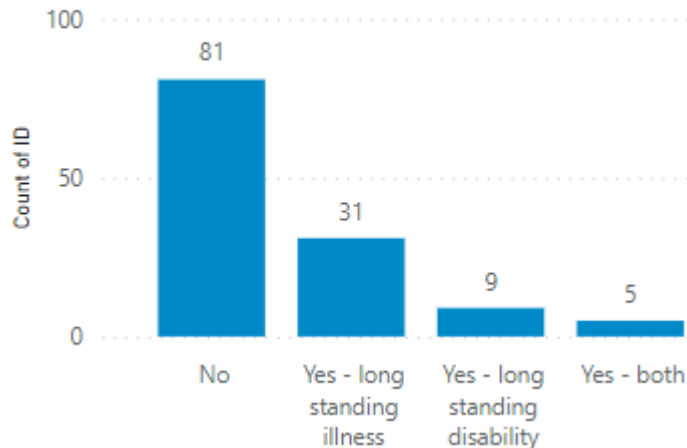

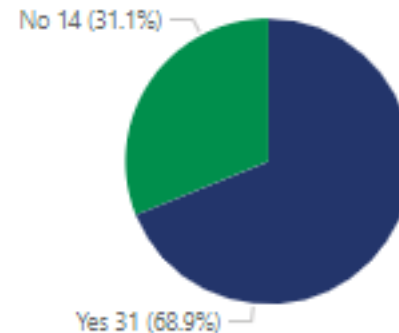

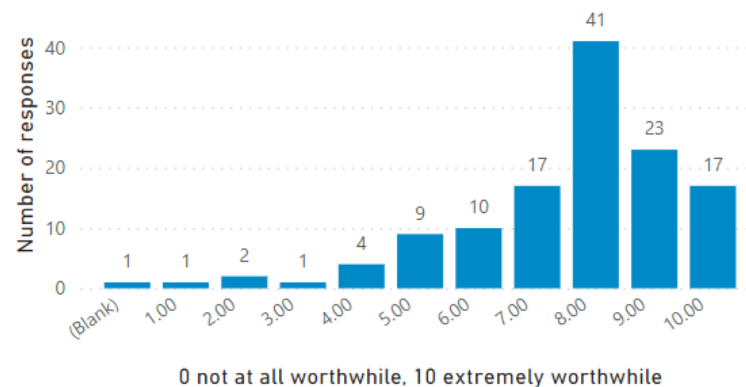

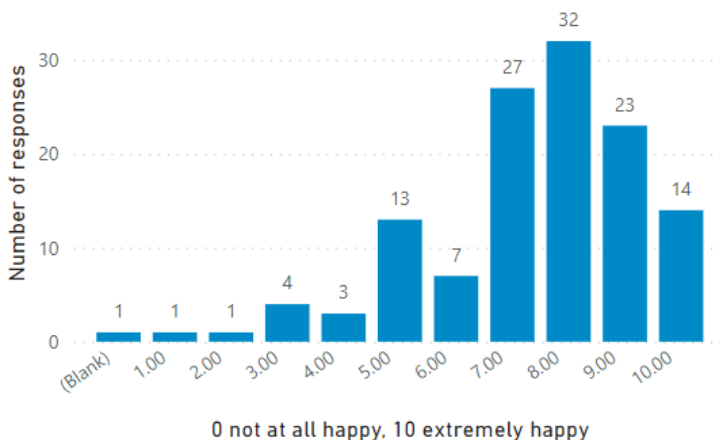

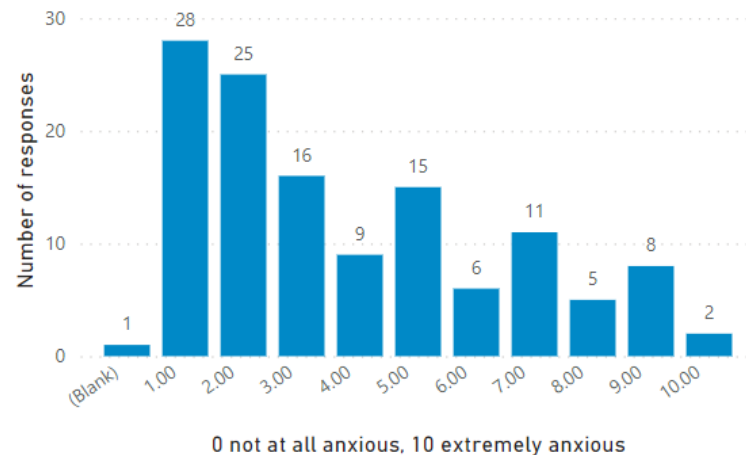

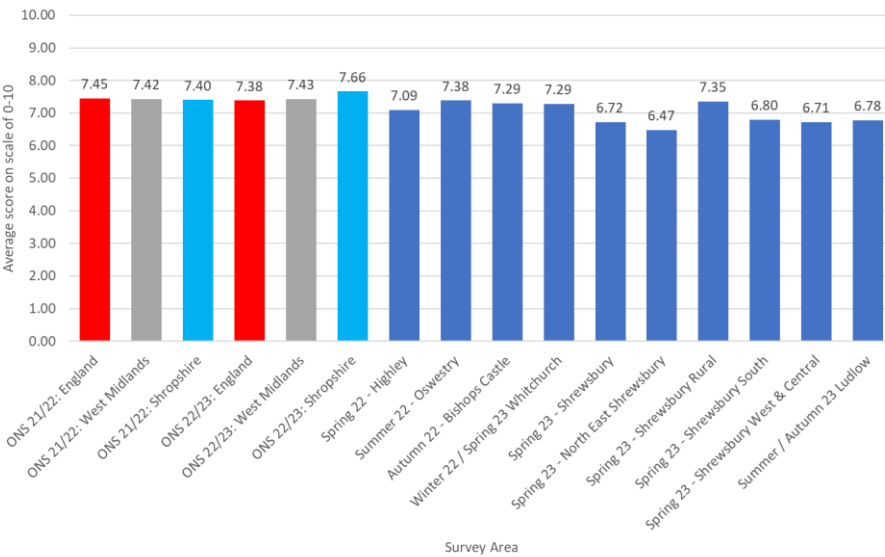

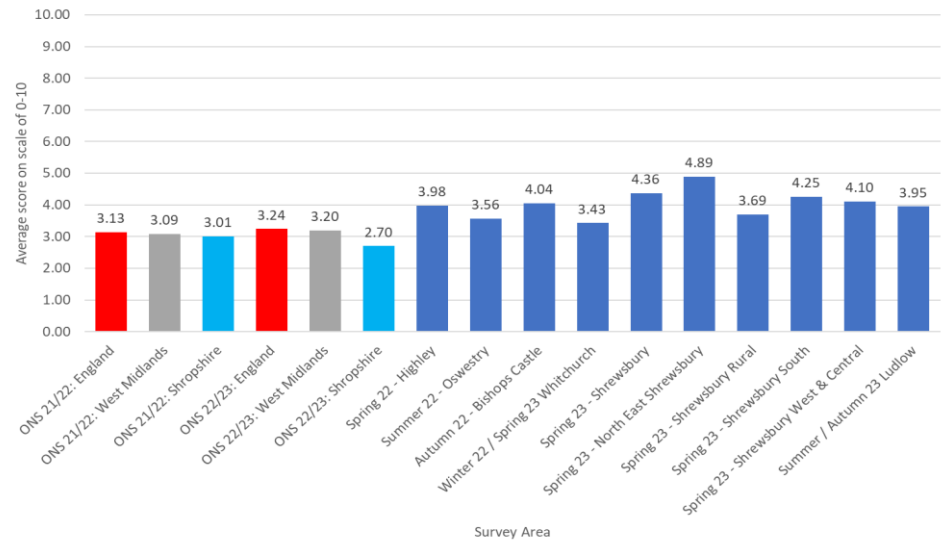
Overall, to what extent do you feel that the things you do in your life are worthwhile?

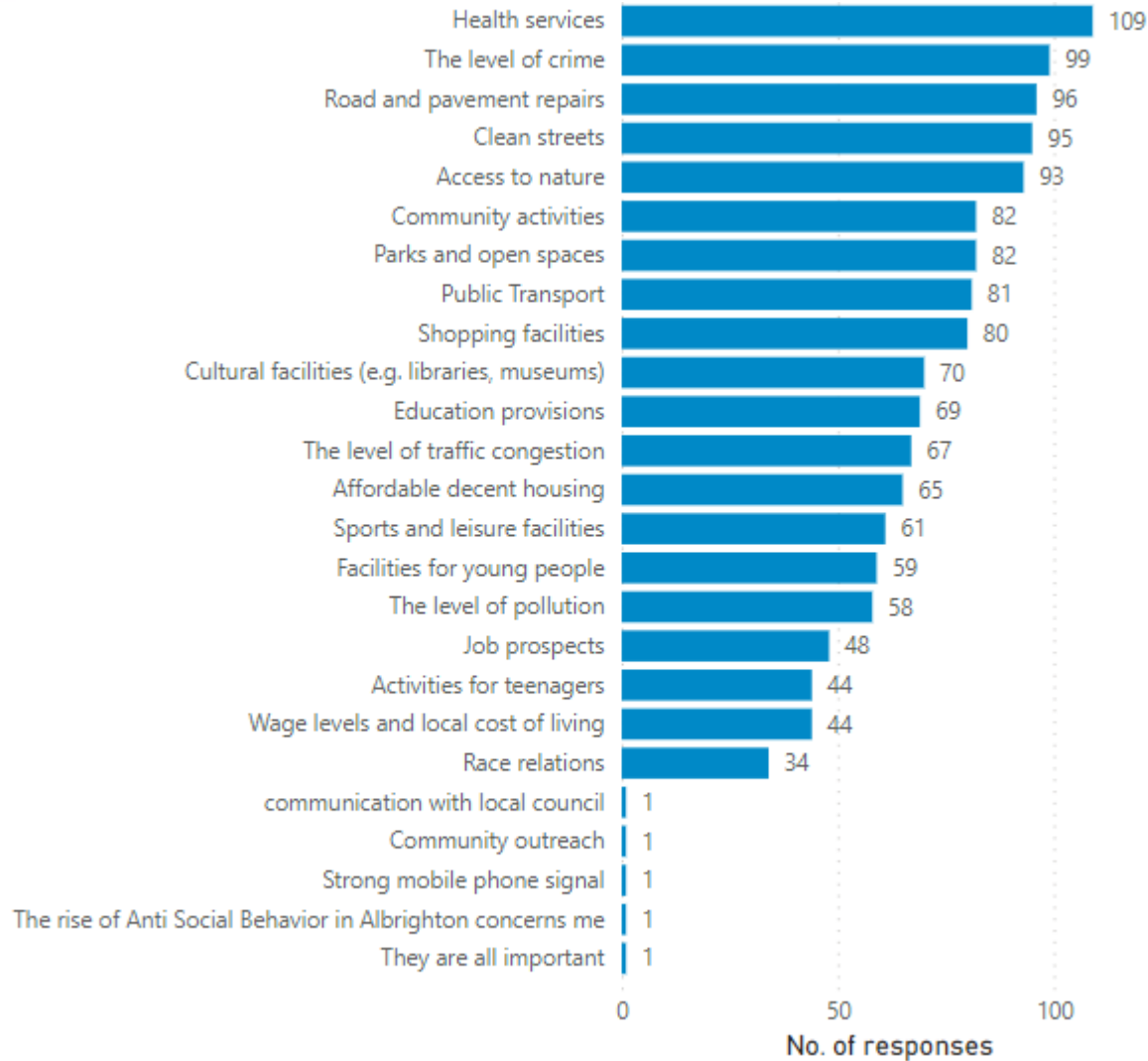

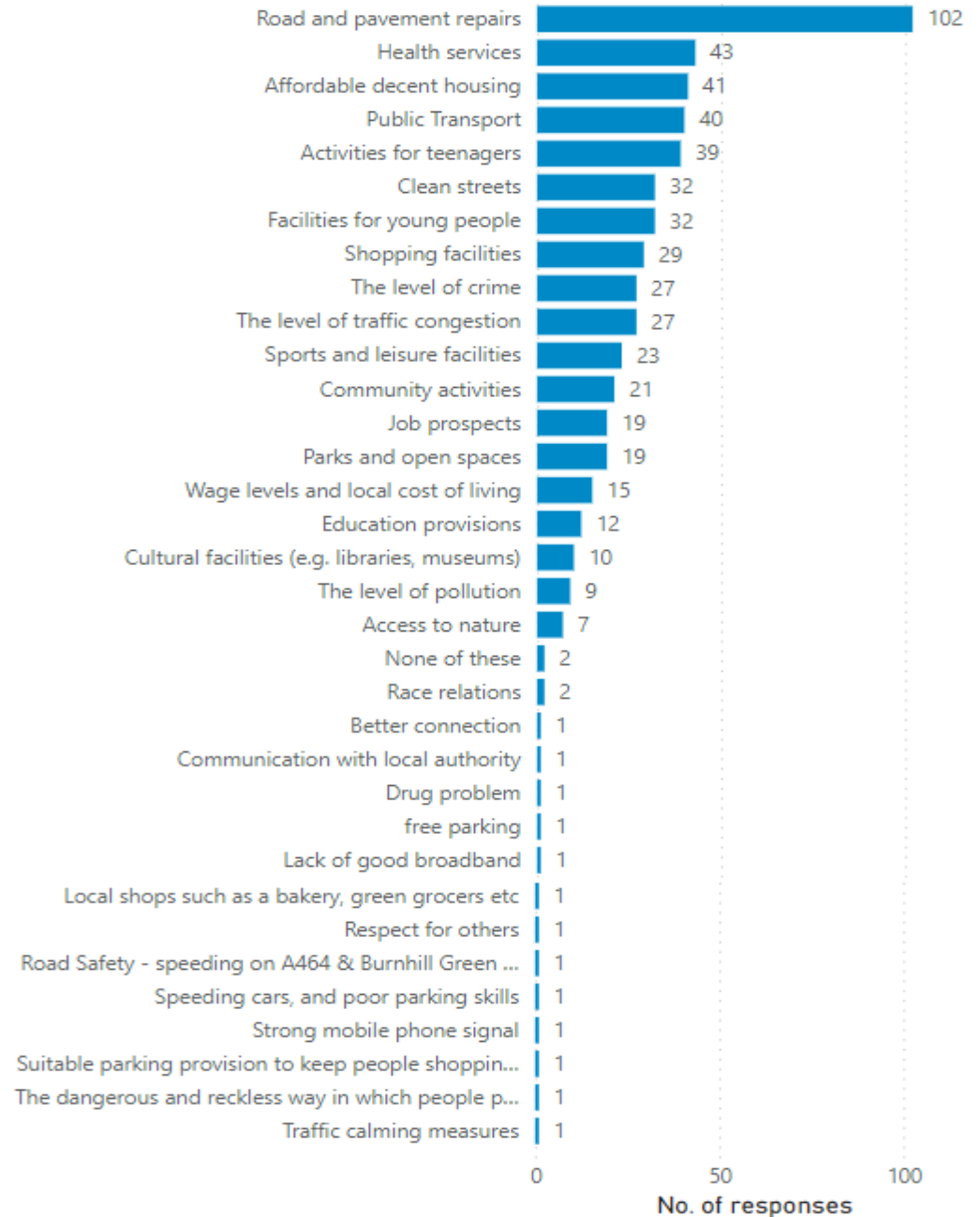
Thinking generally, which of the things below would you say are the most important in making somewhere a good place to live?

Things that most need improving in your local area



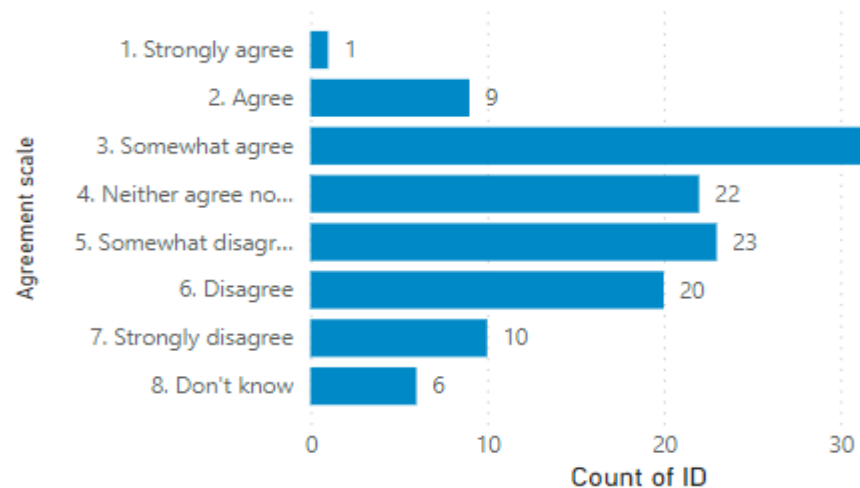
With regard to what needs improving, can you say more?

"The foot bath outside of Albrighton Primary School (directly opposite the school on Newhouse lane) is in need of repair, it's very bumpy from poor pot hole repairs and difficult with a pushchair. It is also only wide enough for two people which is unworkable at pick up and drop off time as you get a parent and child (holding hands) coming one way and often a parent and toddler going then other meaning someone has to go onto the grass. There are also some large pot holes in the roads surrounding Albrighton including an annoying one outside the entrance cent to the garden centre on the far side heading towards the A41. It is dangerous as people often swerve to a sound it. "

"We're semi-rural, and so very lucky, but access to services is getting harder as banks, shops and other facilities are closing; there's no reliable public transport, and less for young people/teens to do. Add to that an aging population who love living in quiet areas, and health provision suffers too."

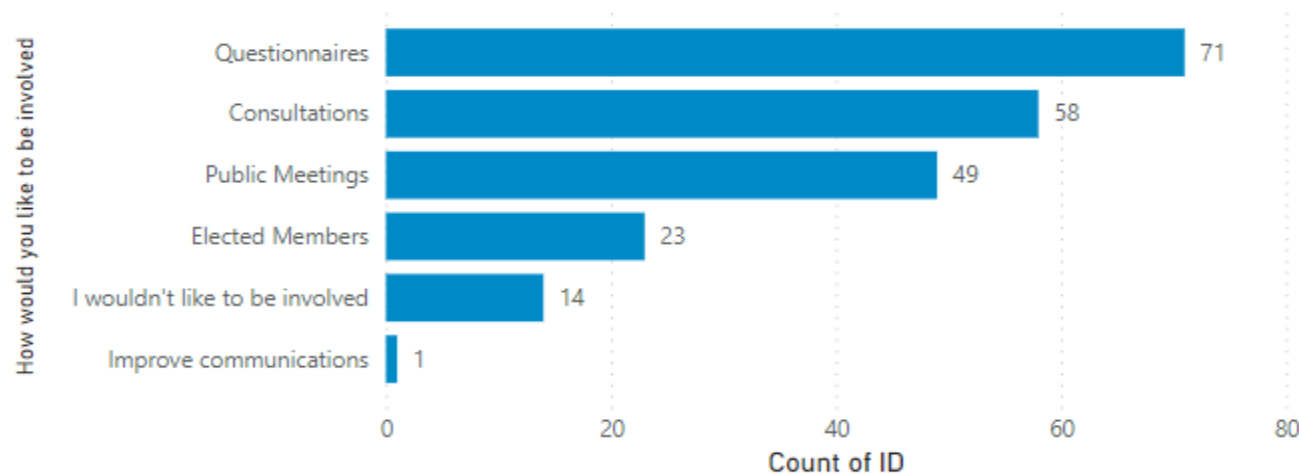
"There isn't enough local housing for those looking to get on to the property ladder or renting. House prices & renting prices are extremely high not just in the county but surrounding areas such as Birmingham. Immigration is high which is likely affecting the housing prices & availability due to more people needing housing, there has also been an increase in people moving into Albrighton and surrounding areas from other populated counties as a result of this. The level of wages (i.e. minimum wage) is not cost effective for owning & maintaining a property or renting, most companies get away with only paying minimum wage. Teenage facilities do not effect me, however, I am aware that this is lacking in the area. There seems to be a lot of support for the elderly, whilst yes there are many elderly residents within the village, more needs to be done with supporting the younger generation in order for them to continue living in the village they were raised in. There is next to no provisions to keep younger generations in the village as they wouldn't be able to live here due to earnings & prices. The roads & pavements in many areas of the village are shocking - meadow road for example has been reported numerous times to Shropshire Council and the pavement just gets patched, however, it is still broken away in many areas - the whole pavement needs repairing. It is like this for many of the populated pavements, likely to be more cost effective to full repair than to keep patching spots where it's clear it needs more than patching. There is a lack of presence from Shropshire Council when it comes to addressing issues and Albrighton feels very neglected by Shropshire Council who prioritise Shrewsbury, when Shrewsbury have a town council so essentially more money is being focussed on their issues alone and the smaller areas/smaller towns/parishes are neglected. Would make far more sense to split the county in two. "

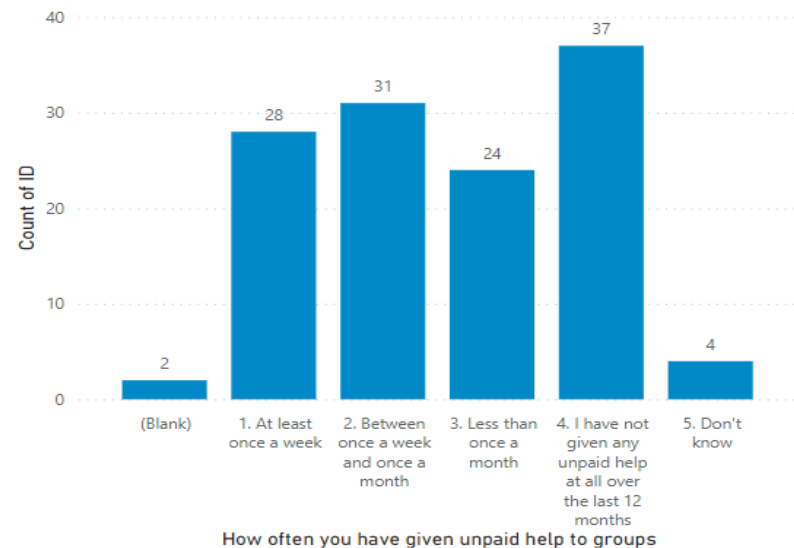


How would you like to be involved in decisions affecting your local area?

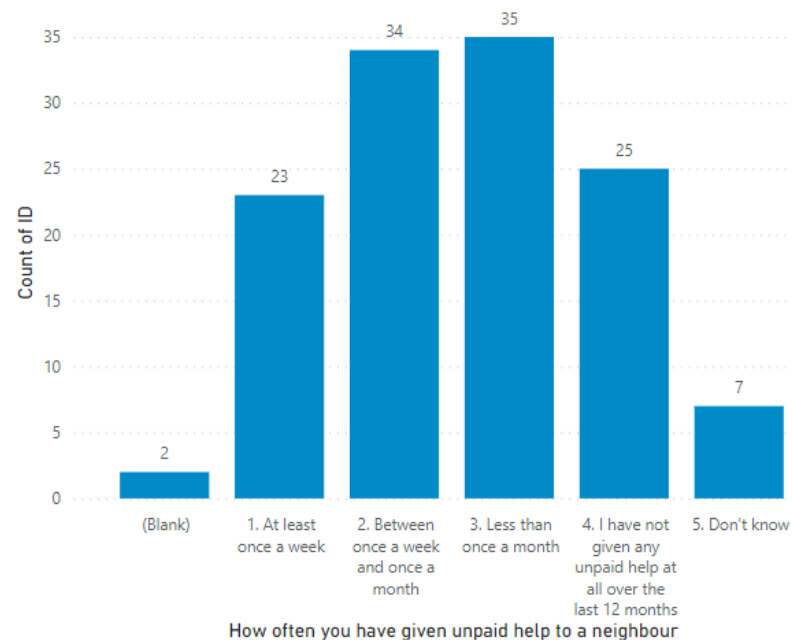

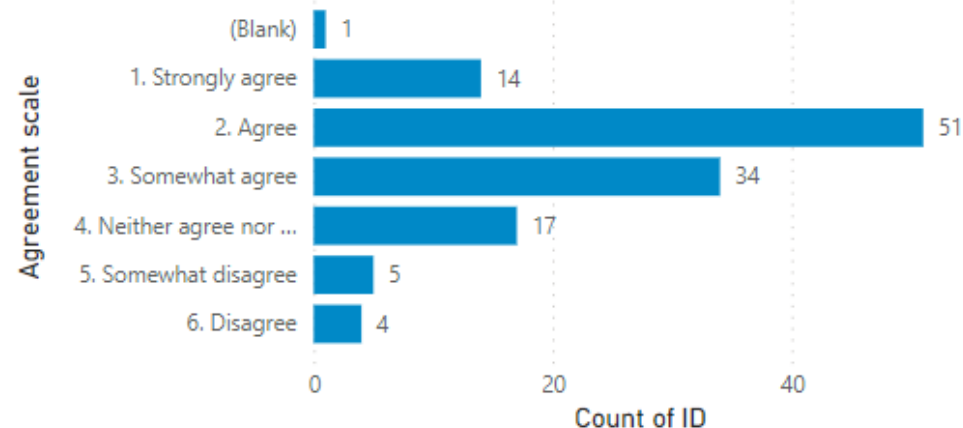

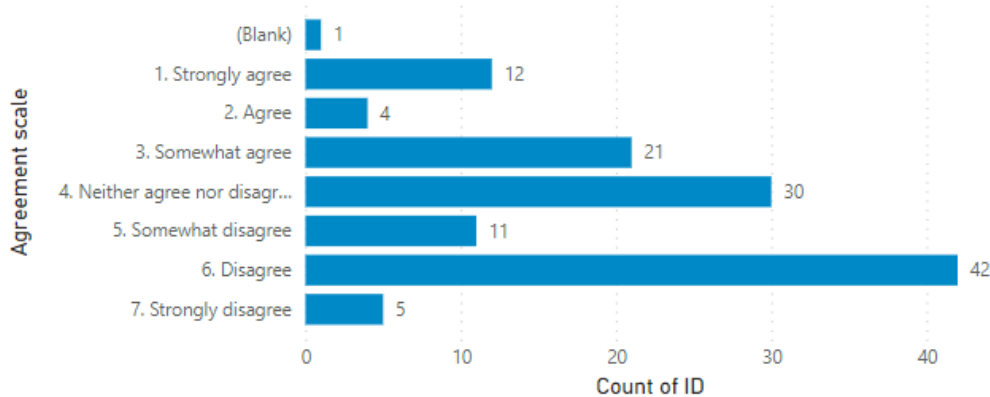
Overall, how often have you give unpaid help to a neighbour?

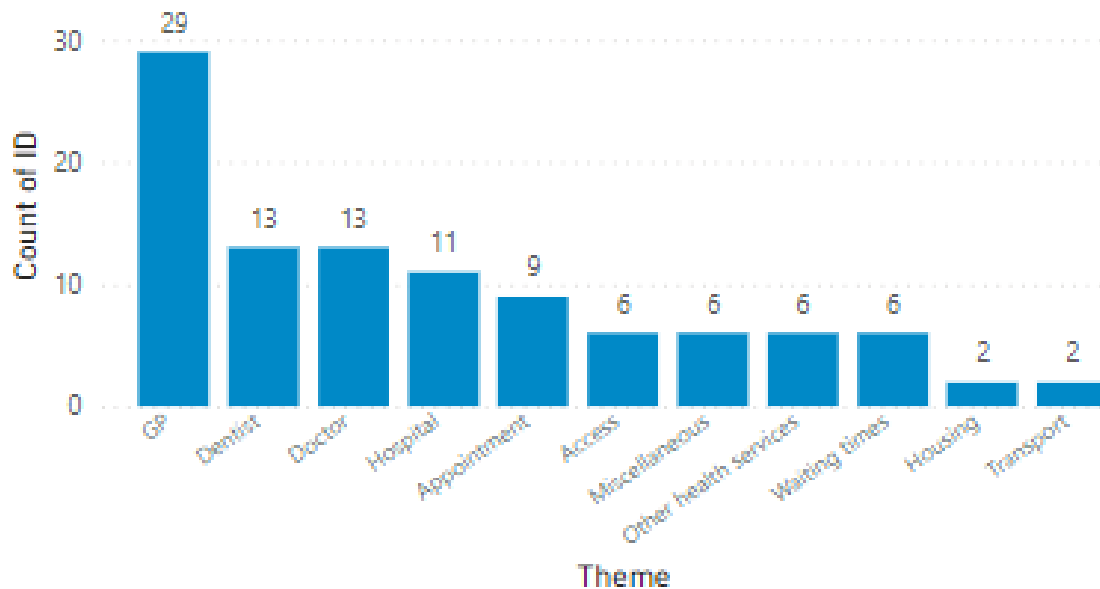

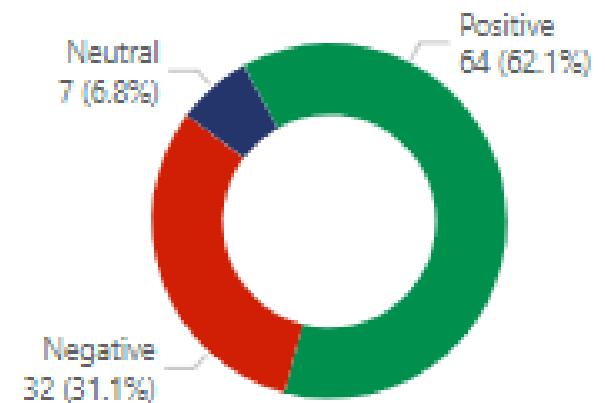

"Excellent service from Drs, Telephone contact is difficult due to number of people on the phone. Melville club is fantastic, Nature Reserve is wonderful but is not accessible for the elderly. "

"Our village dentist takes NHS, which is wonderful, and we still have an independent optician, which is great. The doctors surgery is, however, swamped, and it's not easy to get seen. The road outside is also parked solid and dangerous with the school just 100m away. Add to that the huge new housing estate being built in Albrighton, with no additional parking or GP provision, it's a problem waiting to happen. Our local hospital is the Princess Royal in Telford, which has really poor access. It's slow to get to by bus, or a mile walk from Wellington train station, and if you drive you cannot park there during the day. Seriously, I had to go there for routine tests recently and every verge, every inch of space, was already parked on. You have to park on the local roads half a mile away and walk in. Please, more parking at Princess Royal."

"More access to NHS dentist needed. Bigger GP surgery so that physio, hearing etc could be held in the practice. Consultant clinics held in practice - difficult to get to Princess Royal Hospital in Shrewsbury, Bridgnorth, New Cross etc. Blood Testing to be available every day. Extended opening hours - 7am - 8pm some days to help working residents to need regular appointments. Our medical practice is very good - usually can be seen on the day of booking if it is urgent. Great GPs and Reception staff. Admin staff very helpful. Parking must be improved at Medical Practice and hospital. "

"Generally good appointment access, despite lengthy time in phone queue, connecting to surgery. For those that use transport, parking issues, especially at schools pick up and drop off times - this is a safety issue for children too. "

"I am elderly with severe health problems and my husband died just over a week ago. The Albrighton medical practice have been wonderful. "

"More activities for elderly. More co-ordinated help for elderly with loneliness"

"We need more mental health support in the local area. Our closest is Bridgnorth, that is too far. Making a step to get help for your mental health is a big step in the first place, having to then travel far is too much for many people with mental health needs. If you can only just manage to leave the house to go somewhere locally because you are anxious or another mental health issue, asking us to then go further afield is a lot harder. Making that step is a big thing, but then having to get to Bridgnorth, for some people on long and not very well connected public transport, is a big issue. "

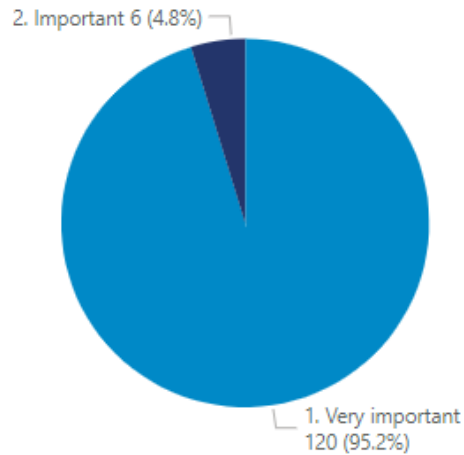
"Social care must be improved - Shropshire council should do this. Residents must be allowed to stay locally if they need residential care - not placed in inaccessible homes at least an hours car journey away. This practice is isolating residents from their friends and community and not helping in their daily lives. No one caring for them knows anything about their lives. "

"Melville club and bus is good for the village. Not sure if anything is in existence whereby members of the public can, occasionally visit the elderly, just for a chat. "

"It would be good to have a list of where the above are and telephone numbers to contact them. "

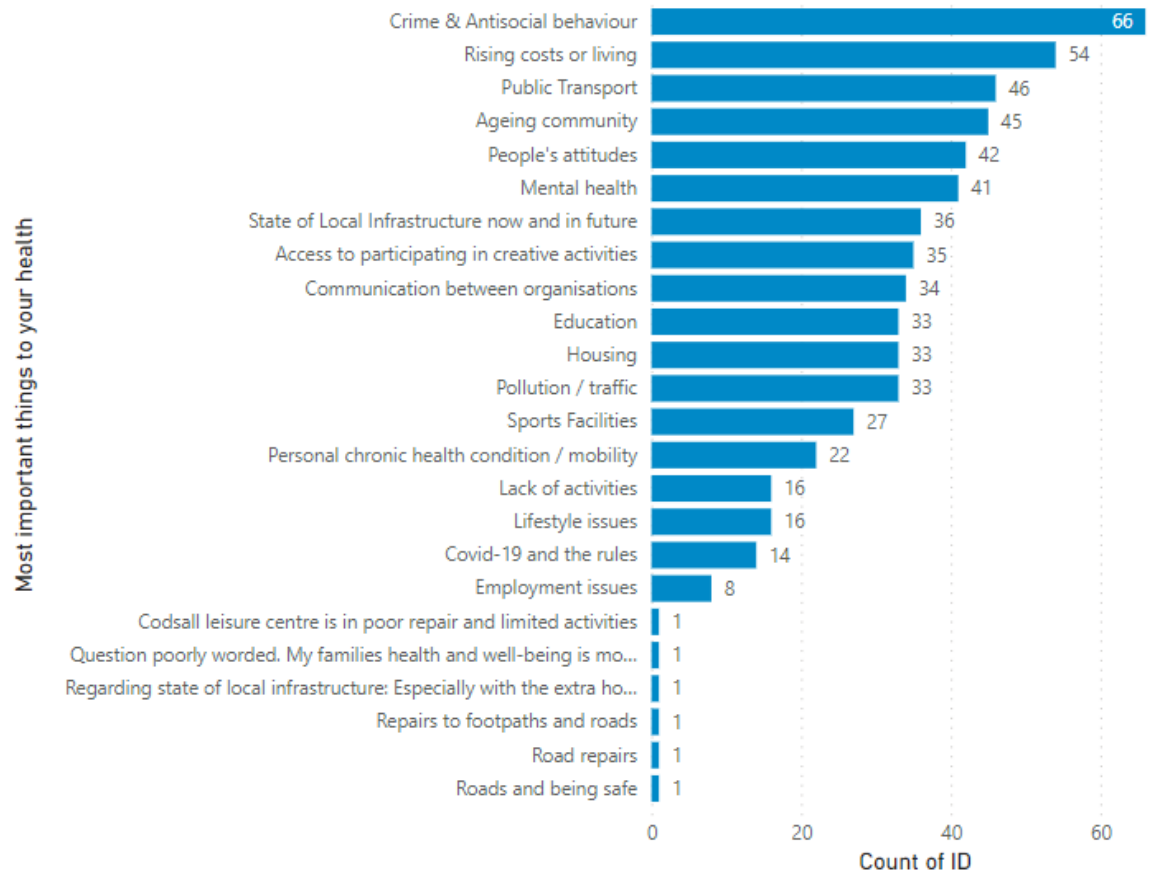
"I love the fitness classes at the red house"

What do you think the biggest health issues are that affect you and your family?

"Getting old. so getting access to a GP, being able to visit our local hospital if we need to, and those access problems (public transport and parking). Some provision is provided in Bridgnorth, which is even harder to get to."

"Heavily oversubscribed dental practice and surgery. State of the local roads, particularly pavements. I am a fit individual but I have had a couple of falls due to the lack of repair of pavements etc. I am not alone and have helped to pick locals out of the road when they have tripped or fallen or have been tipped off their mobility scooters because of the total lack of repair of the pavements - Station Road, Kingswood Road etc - Disabled young man next door - the pavement on Kingswood Road between Shaw Lane and Meadow Road is so bad that the father cannot take the direct route into the village - just up the road is a care home. Too dangerous for the residents to access the village - just up the road is a care home. Too dangerous for the residents to access the village. "

"I have severe arthritis and terminal cancer, plus other health problems. My husband died very recently and I worry how I will cope in the future."

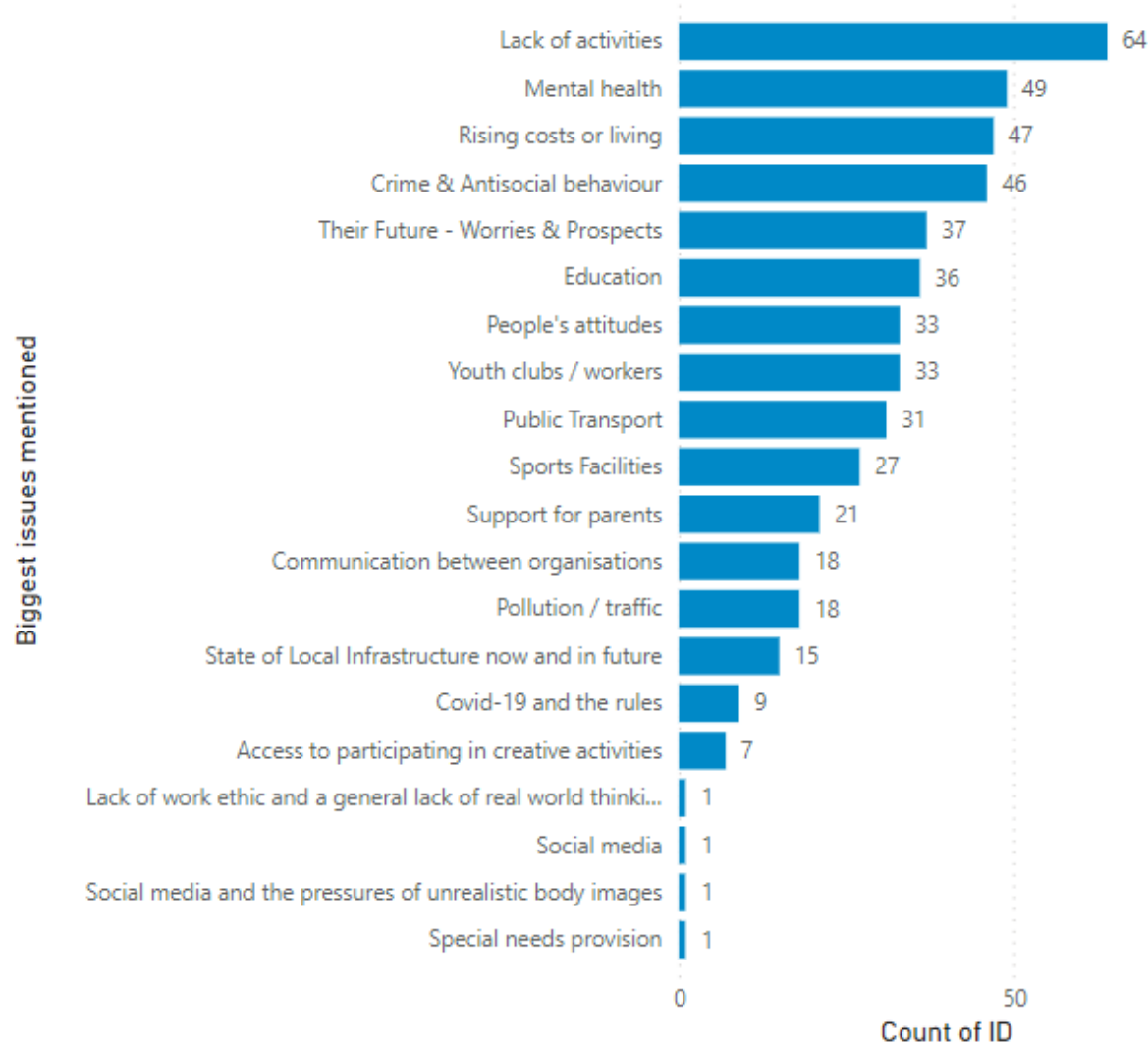
"Lack of accessibility to green space and walks in the area - have to get in a car to go and walk a decent length without having to walk on roads. We don't mind walking on roads (e.g Rectory Road etc..) but find the car owners drive dangerously"

"Rising cost of living to expensive single parent with children it's hard to keep track on groceries and putting heating on all the time and electric "

"We have a fantastic medical practice - needs to be extended or a new building, to cater for the rise in housing and new residents. Primary care is very good, but if we had a bigger building, lots of consultant appointments could be held more locally, so avoiding blocking up space in secondary care. Secondary care is very difficult at the moment, especially if you do not have your own transport. "

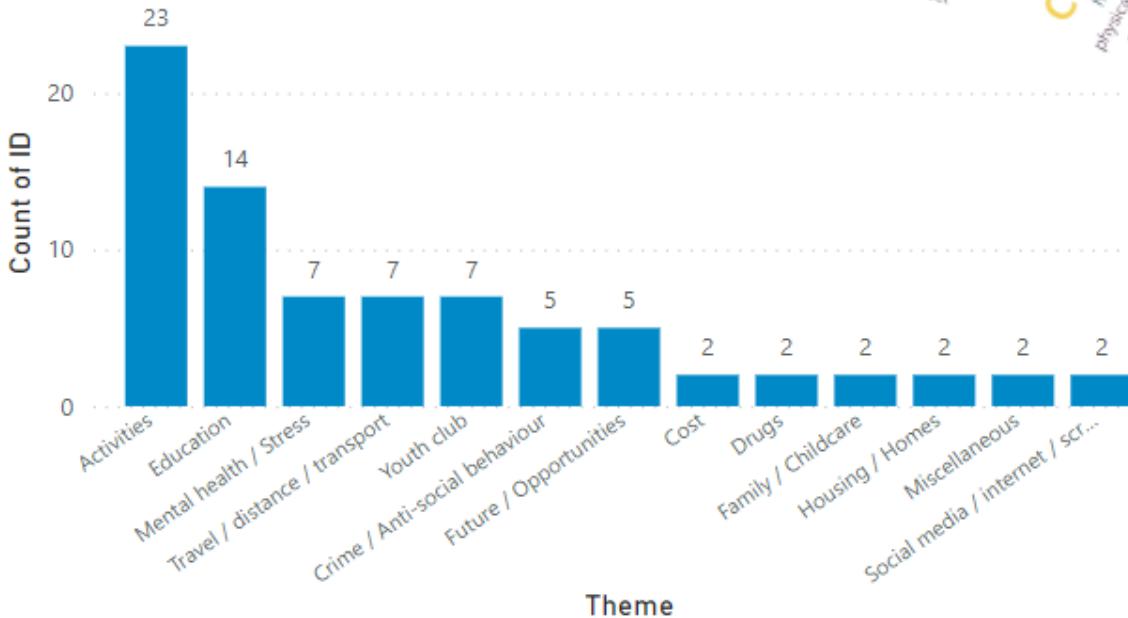

What issues most need to be addressed to support children and young people?

"For young people it's rising costs of living & their future where they will be mentally and actually being able to afford a property. "

"cost and access of public transport to allow isolated locations to reach work and activities. Some houses we have considered have not been purchased as there is no way for our youngest child to reach anywhere. (Alscott Meads development for example) "

"Better and more accessible SEN provision for pre school/primary school children"

"Peoples attitudes towards them - people in this area forget that they were young once"

"Safe crossing to school when walking to school (to be encouraged) at Station Road and Shaw Lane. There used to be a crossing lady/man in years gone by. A zebra crossing would be a good idea. Traffic is going far too fast there and no safe crossing. "

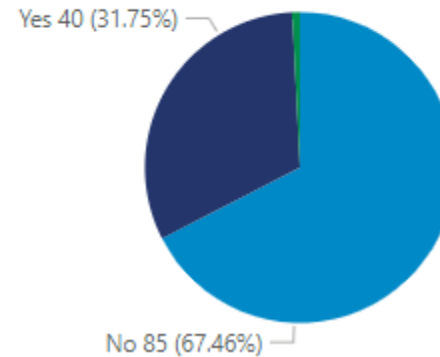
"Availability of activities and services that are not chargeable to parents. This is a barrier for some people. Better performing secondary schools or access to a wider catchment area"

"Facilities to support the greater number of younger families moving to the area."

"Early access to mental health services - waiting times are far too long. Better public transport so that young people have access to education, employment, social life. More support from police in tackling drug related issues - early intervention. More social activities for 16 - 35 age group, children and old people well catered for. The right education for individual children. "

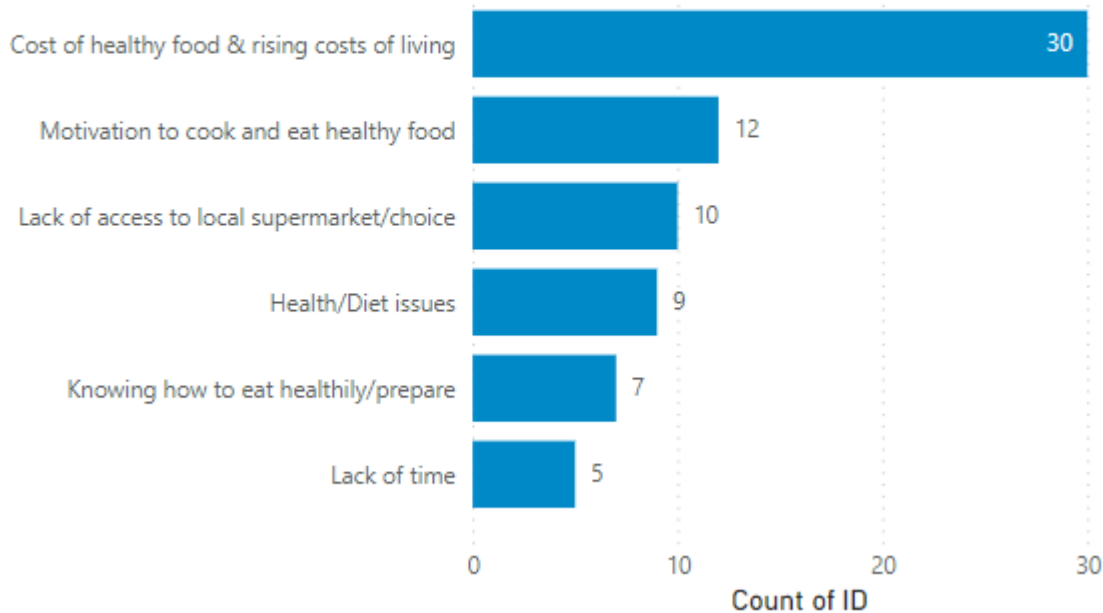

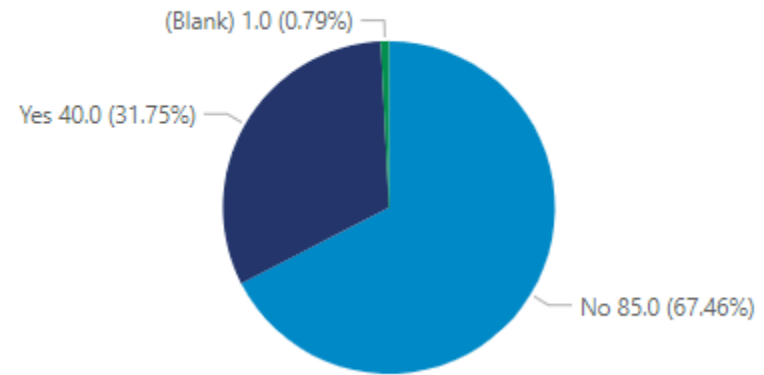
What the challenges mentioned were to eating healthy food

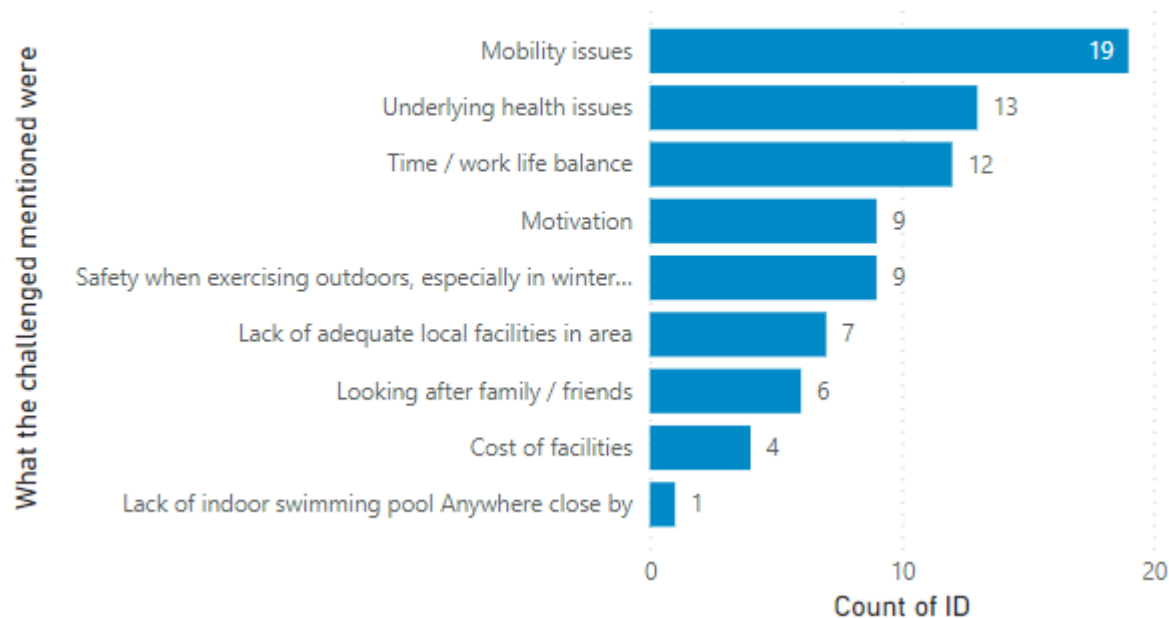


Are there challenges for you and your family with regard to being active in your daily life?

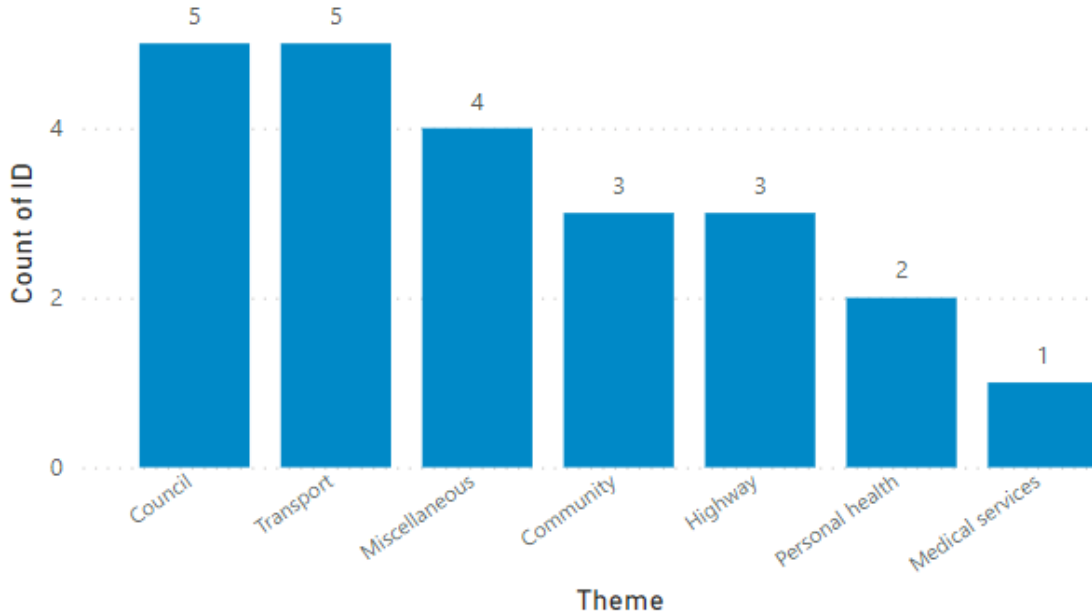
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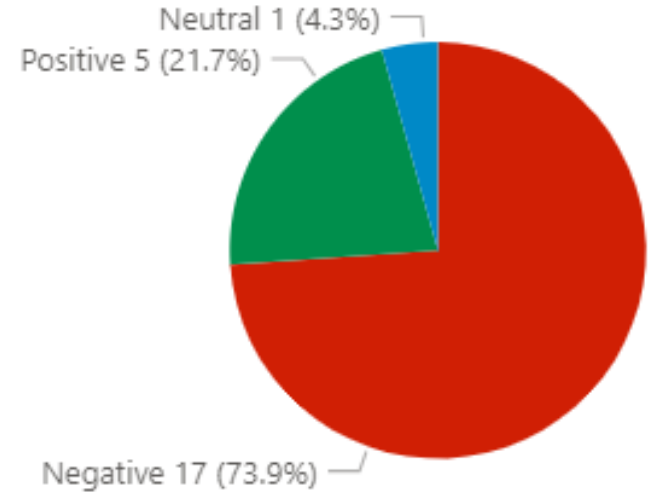

"Poor childcare provision for under 2s and during school holidays. Limits working parents."

"Please address footpaths in Station Road Pavements are uneven and it is not safe for the community to be out and about because of this. Very dangerous by Cedar Drive on Station Road. No dip in path for walker or stepping down and have to walk in the road. Crossing Station Road after Brooklands Road to get to surgery is VERY dangerous, for elderly especially. the traffic speed. and Mandy at Melville is wonderful."

"Unable to walk far and lack of good pavements to Melville Club make walking VERY difficult especially at the corner of Cedar Drive. Pavement runs out and no dip for walker or wheelchairs. Have to walk in road and traffic is very fast and dangerous. Need zebra crossing at Station Road and Shaw Lane for elderly and school children when crossing and for elderly when crossing for surgery. "

"Parking of cars for school activities in and around New House Lane needs to be addressed. School needs to take responsibility and open grounds for parking if they want to host events or rent out facilities. School drop off and pick up times are a nightmare and nobody cares at all about the local residents. "

"I am concerned that Albrighton will gradually be subsumed into Telford / Wolverhampton or both. I arrived in Albrighton 26 years ago when it was definitely described as a village - now it is described as a model market town - how did this happen - not what I joined up for! Planner are calling us a model market town, but we are without any of the facilities to go with it. "
