What is a Joint Strategic Needs Assessment?

Local Authorities and CCGs (now ICS) have a legal Statutory Duty to undertake a Joint Strategic Needs Assessment (JSNA), through the health and wellbeing board.

The JSNA seeks to identify **current** and **future health and wellbeing** needs in the local population and identify strategic **priorities** to inform commissioning of services based on those needs.

These priorities in turn inform the **Health and Wellbeing Strategy** and **Integrated Care Strategy**, key documents as a basis for commissioning health and social care services in the local area. We also believe they should support local **partners/communities' priorities**.

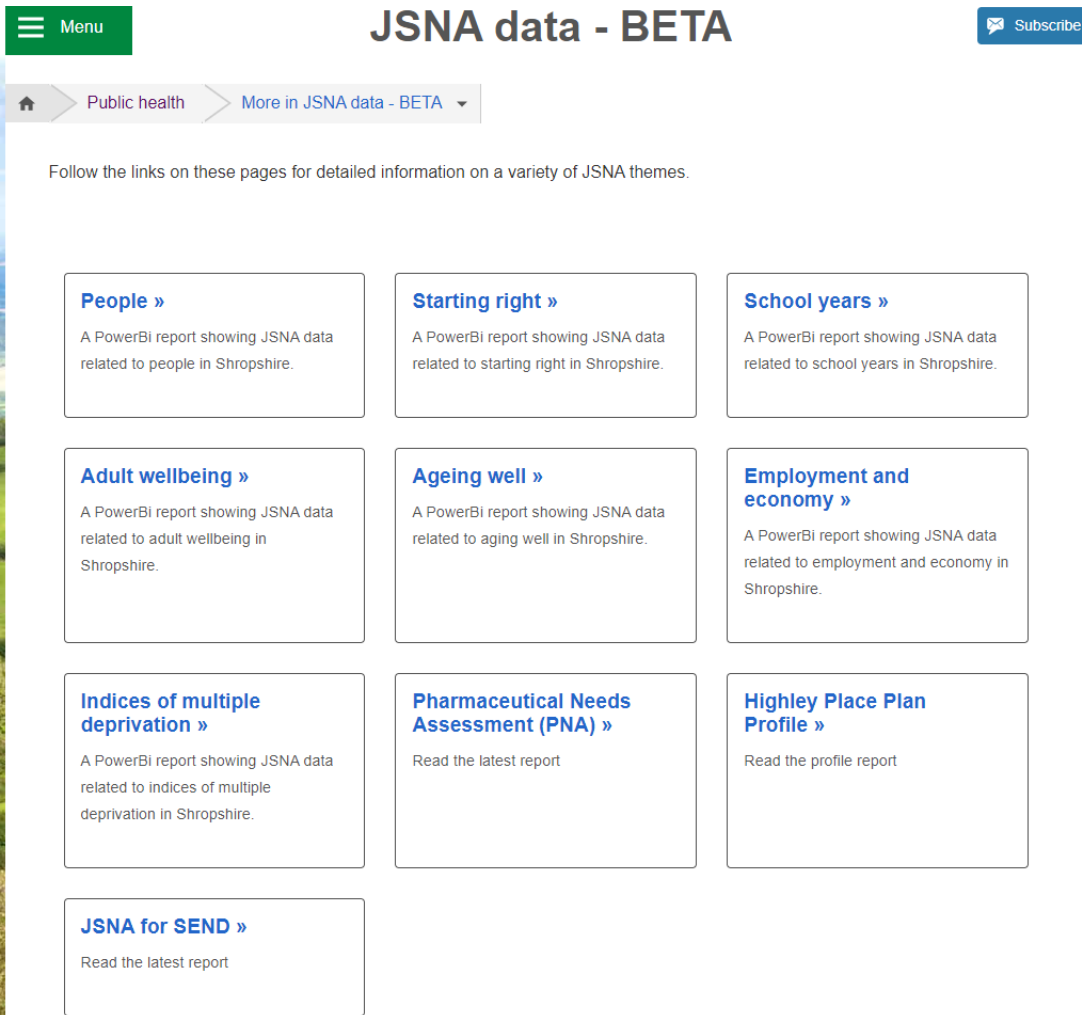
In Shropshire, our JSNA takes three types:

- Web based profiling Tool
- Thematic Needs Assessments - e.g., pharmacy, drug and alcohol and children
- **Place Based Needs Assessments**

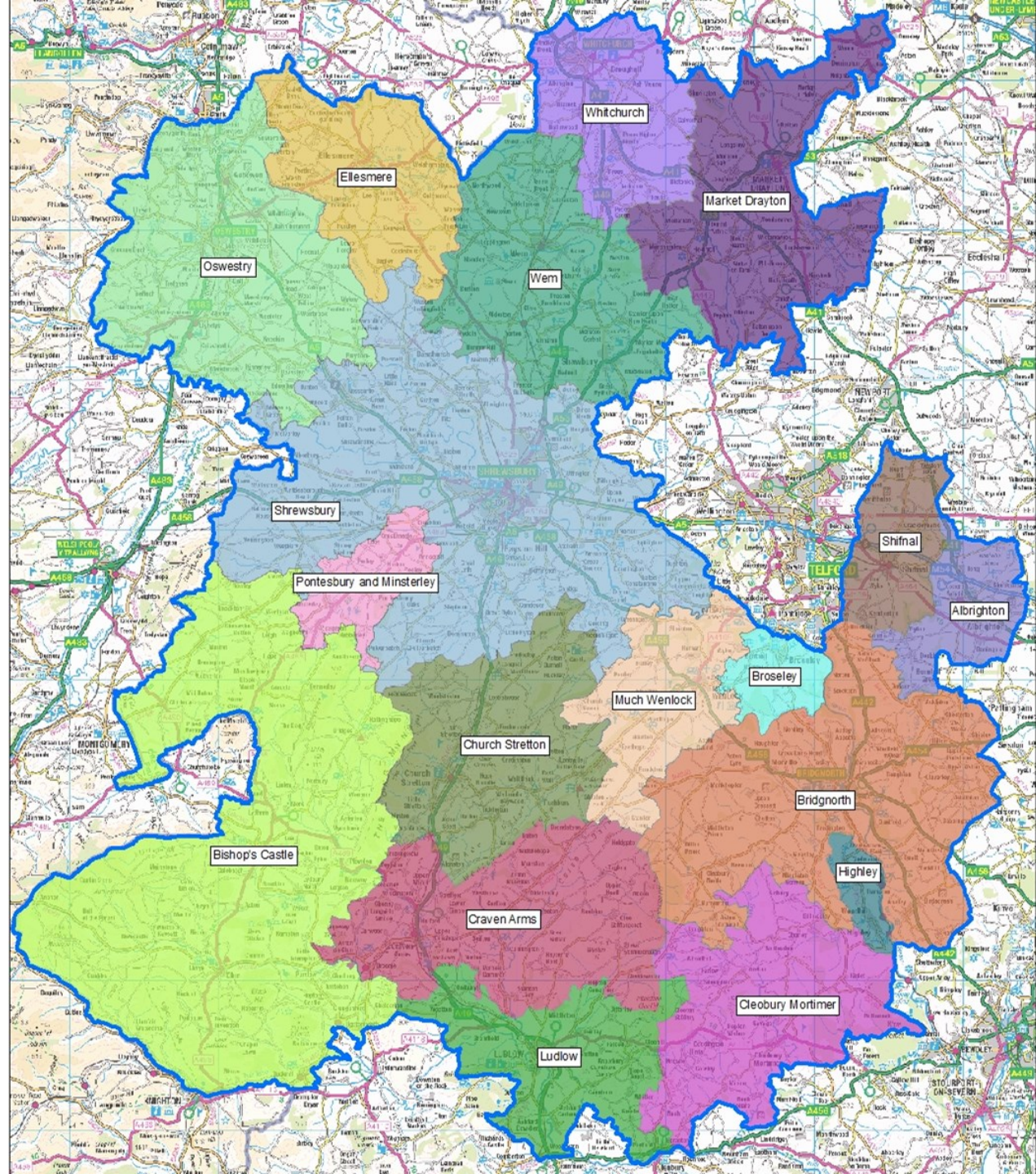

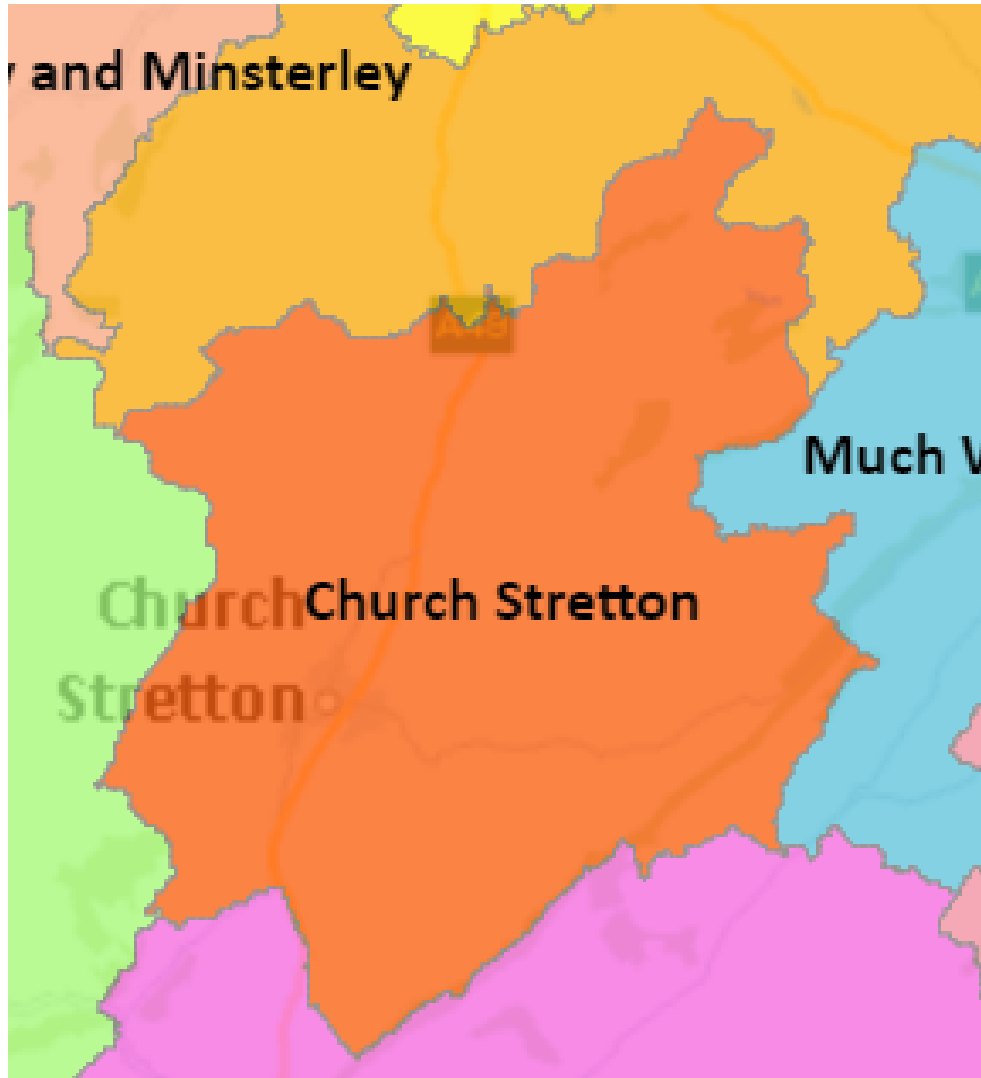

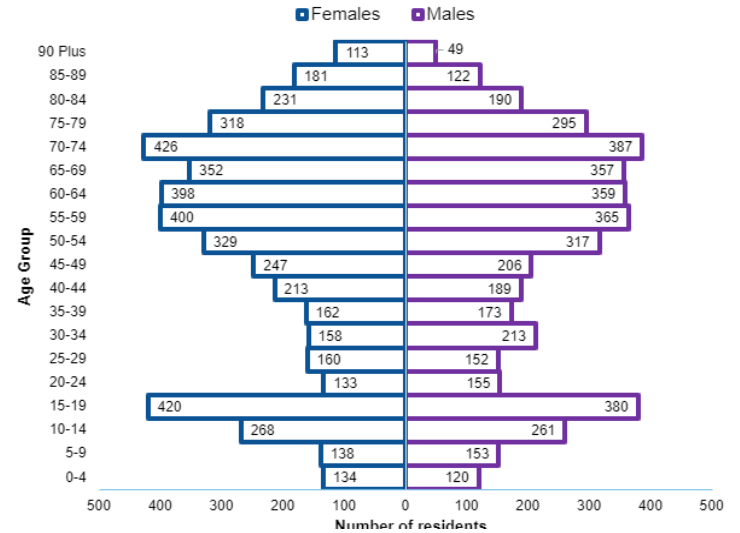

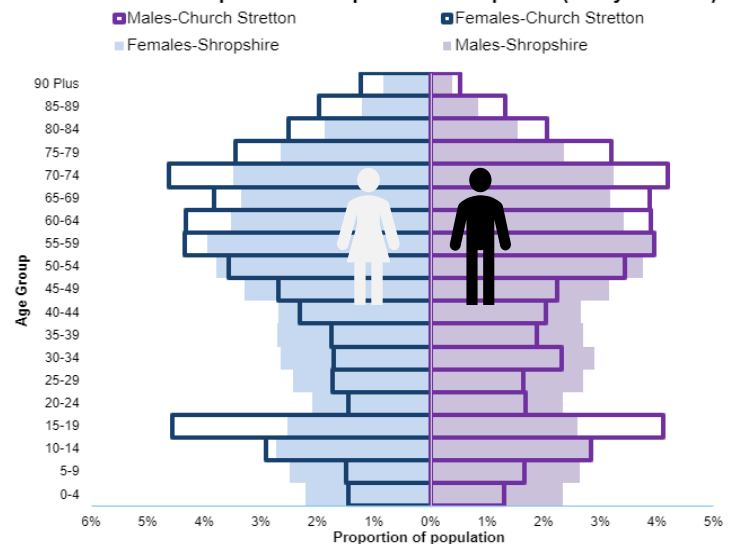

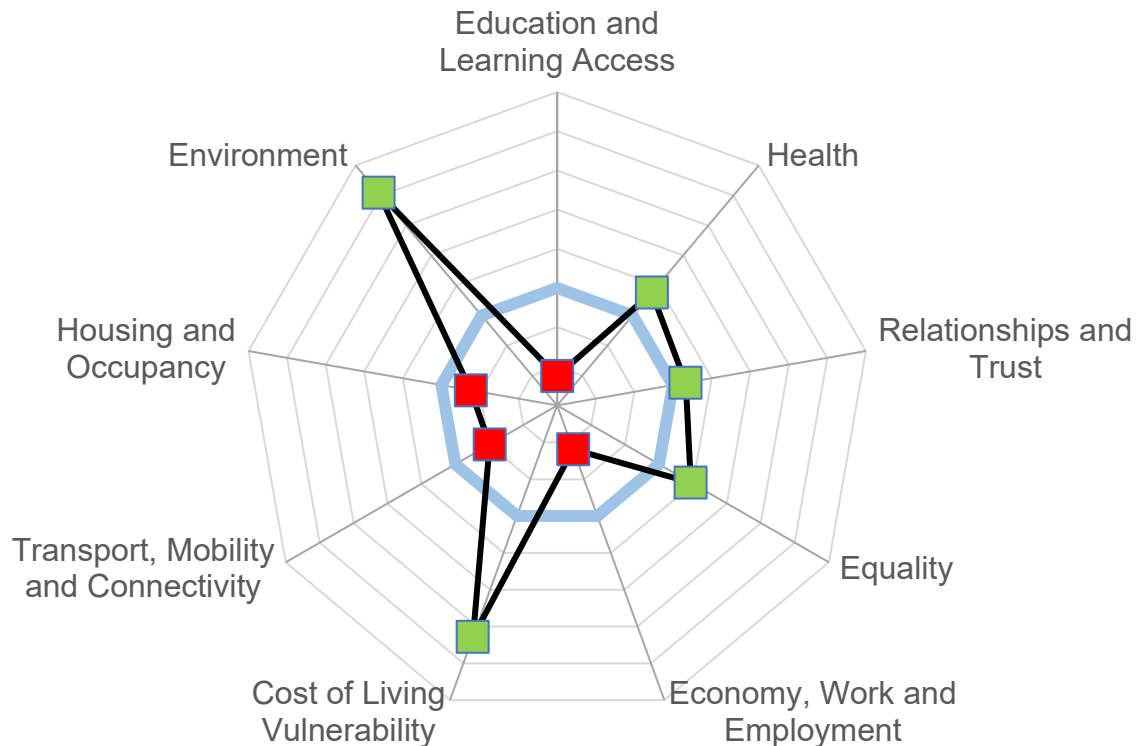

Smoking at time of delivery

Based on births that occurred in SATH, which were Shropshire mothers

- Church Stretton had 182 deliveries between 2017/18 and 2021/22, which is the 13th highest of the 18 place plan areas.
- However, the rate of smoking (9.3%) was the 13th highest place plan area, significantly similar to Shropshire's (12.3%)

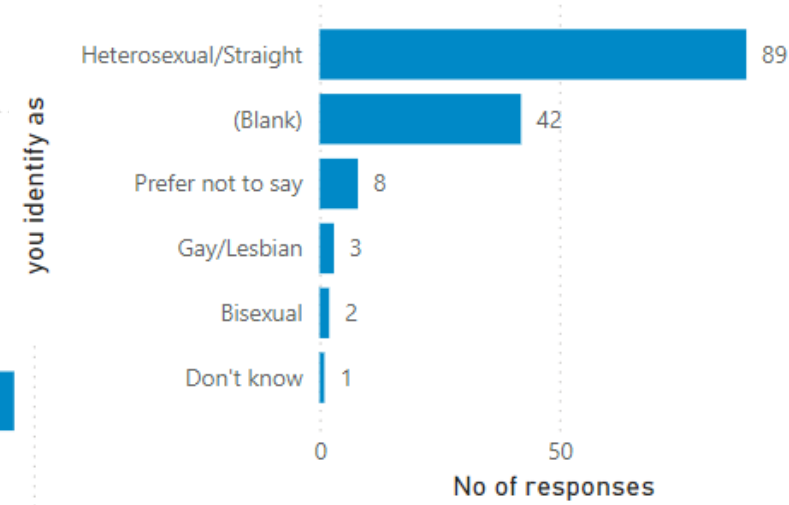
Community Engagement Survey Results

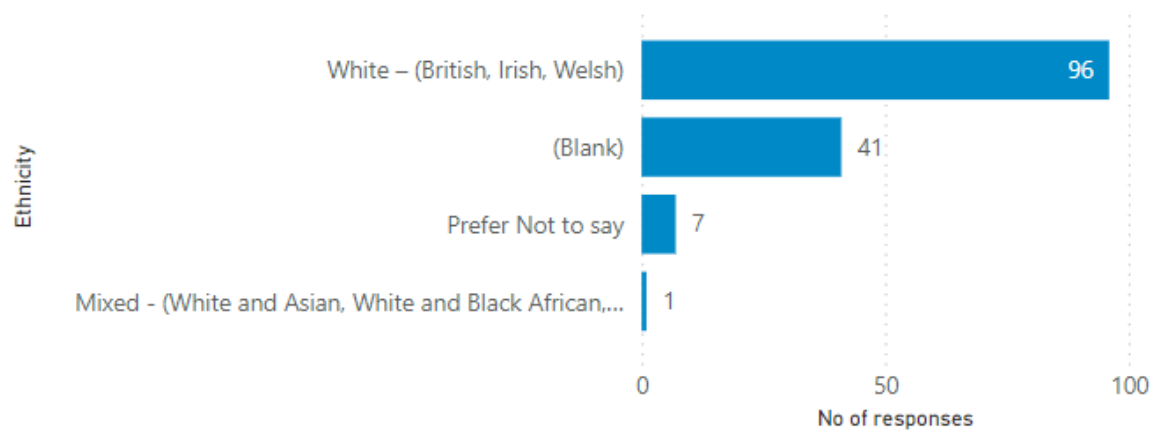

How do you identify as

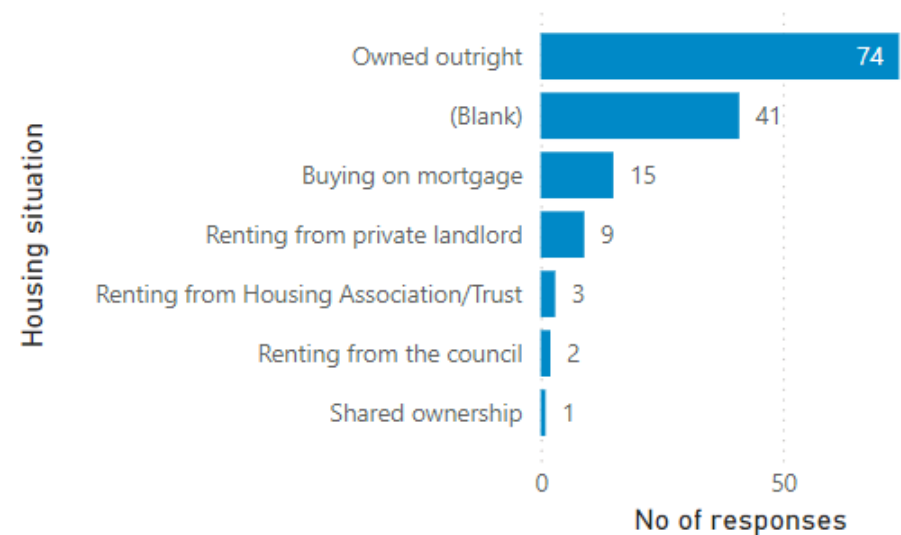


What is your ethnic group?

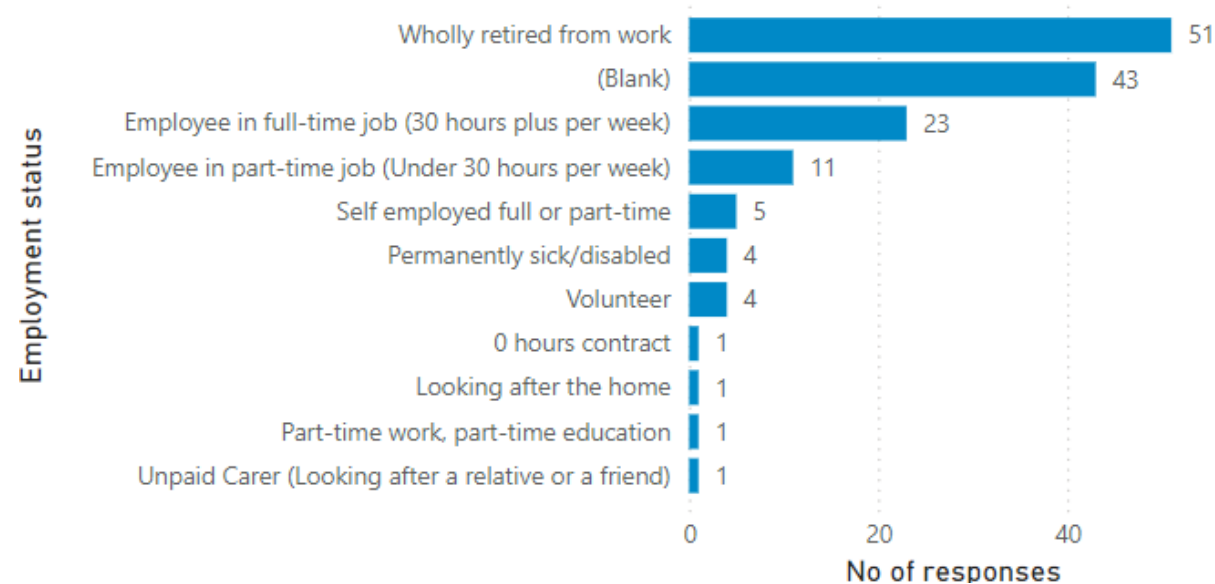

Which of these housing situations applies to you?

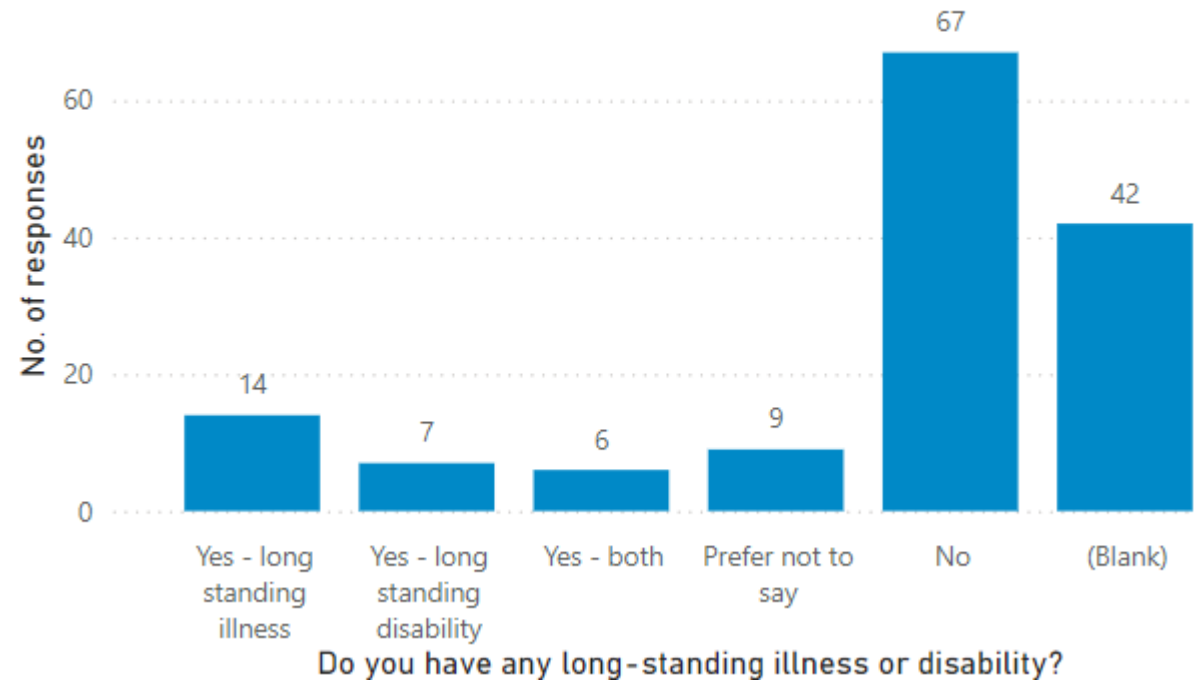


Employment status; which of these activities best describes what you are doing at present?

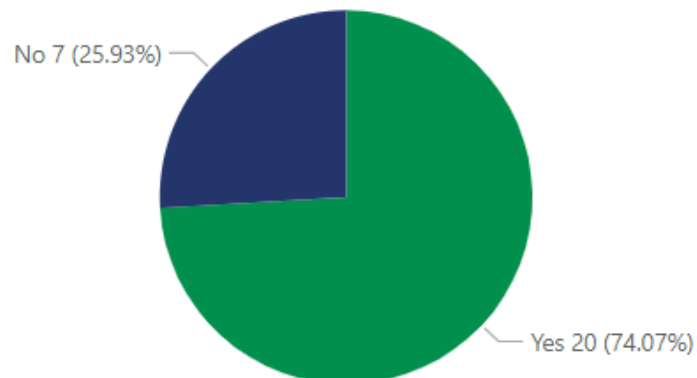

If you have a long-standing illness or disability, does it limit your activities in any way?

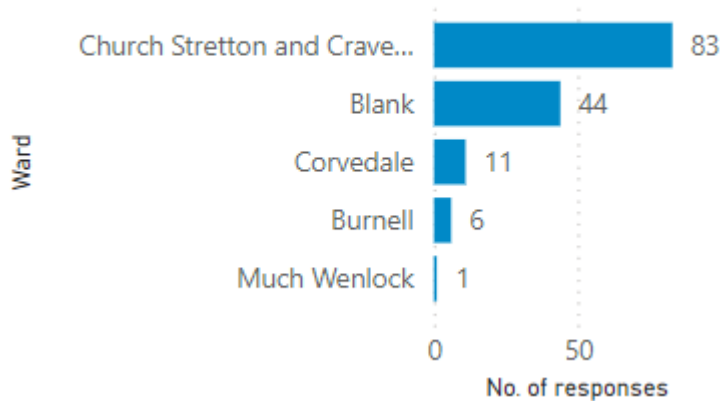

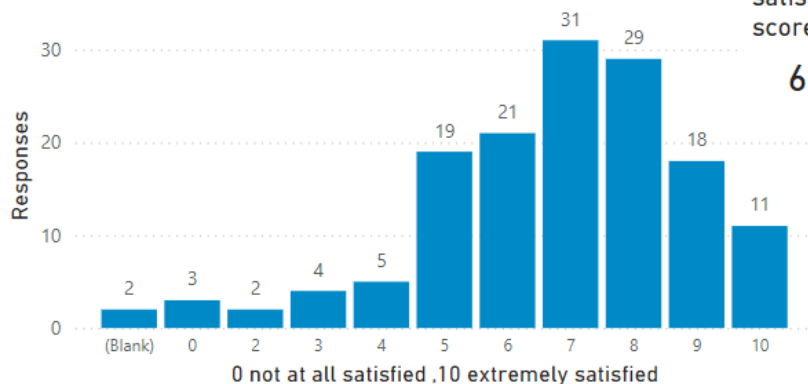

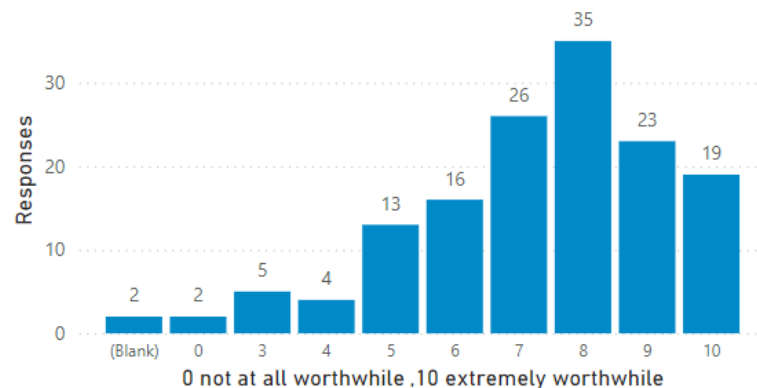
Overall, how satisfied are you with your life nowadays?

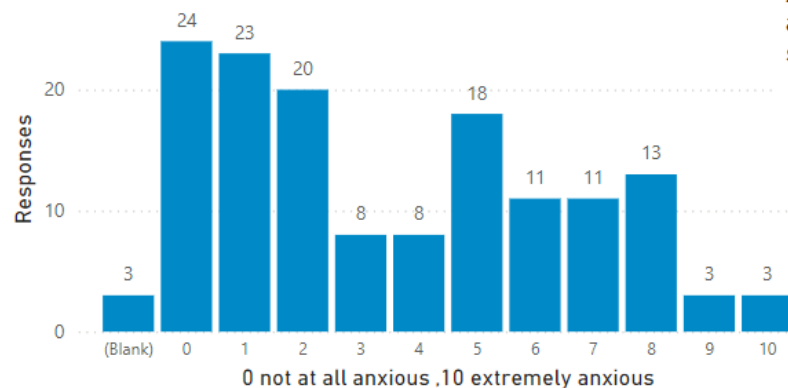
Overall, how happy did you feel yesterday?

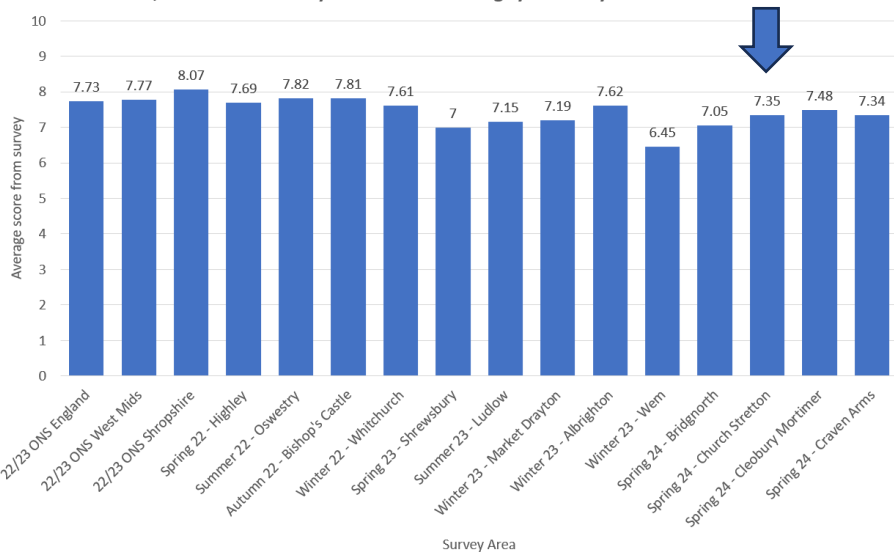
Overall, how anxious did you feel yesterday?



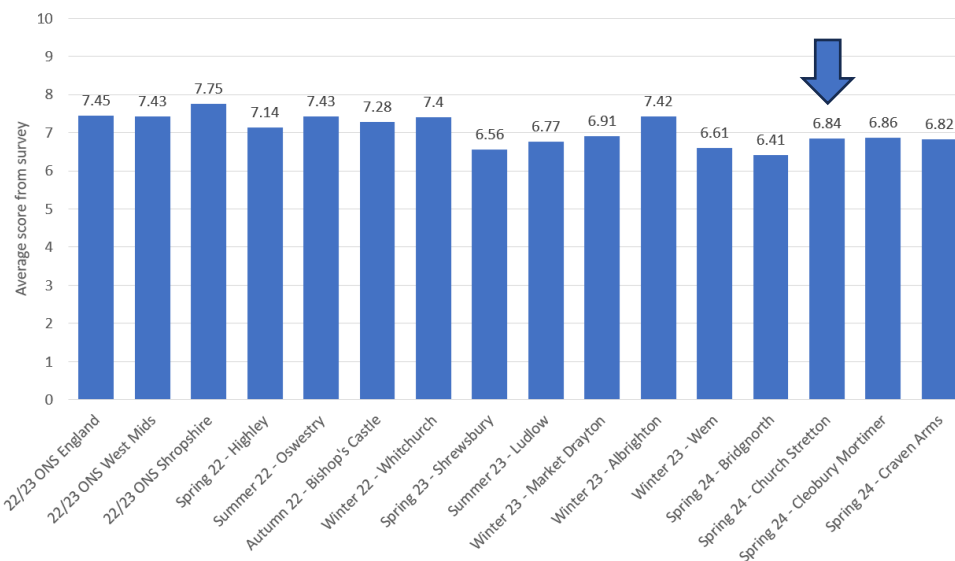

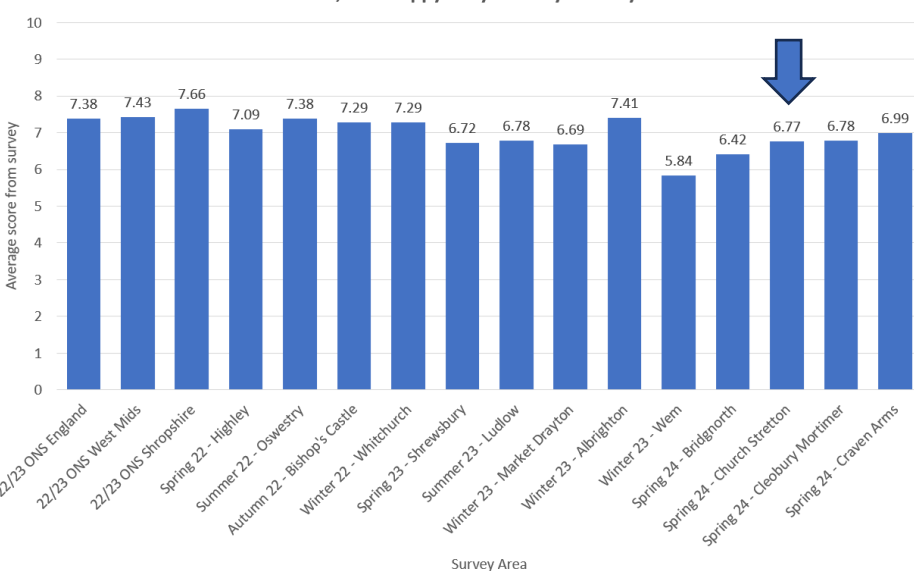

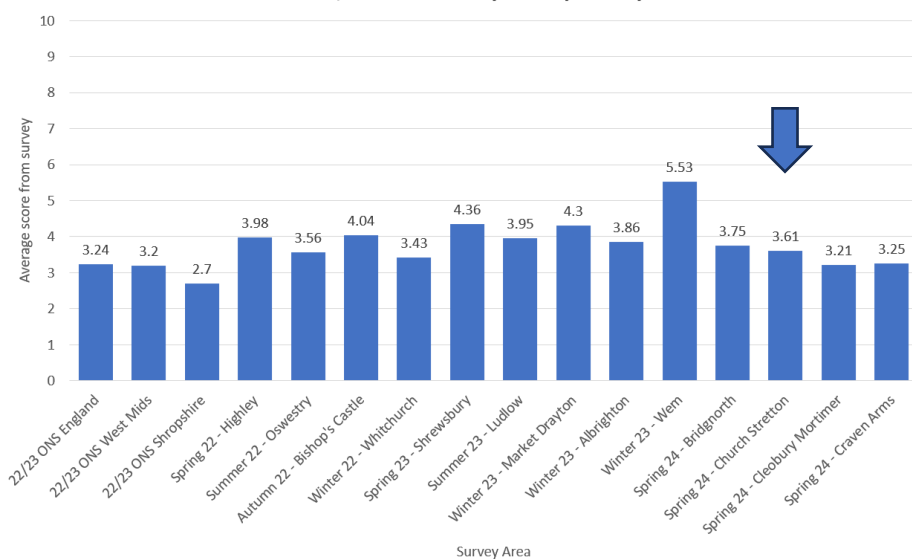
Overall, how satisfied are you with your life nowadays?

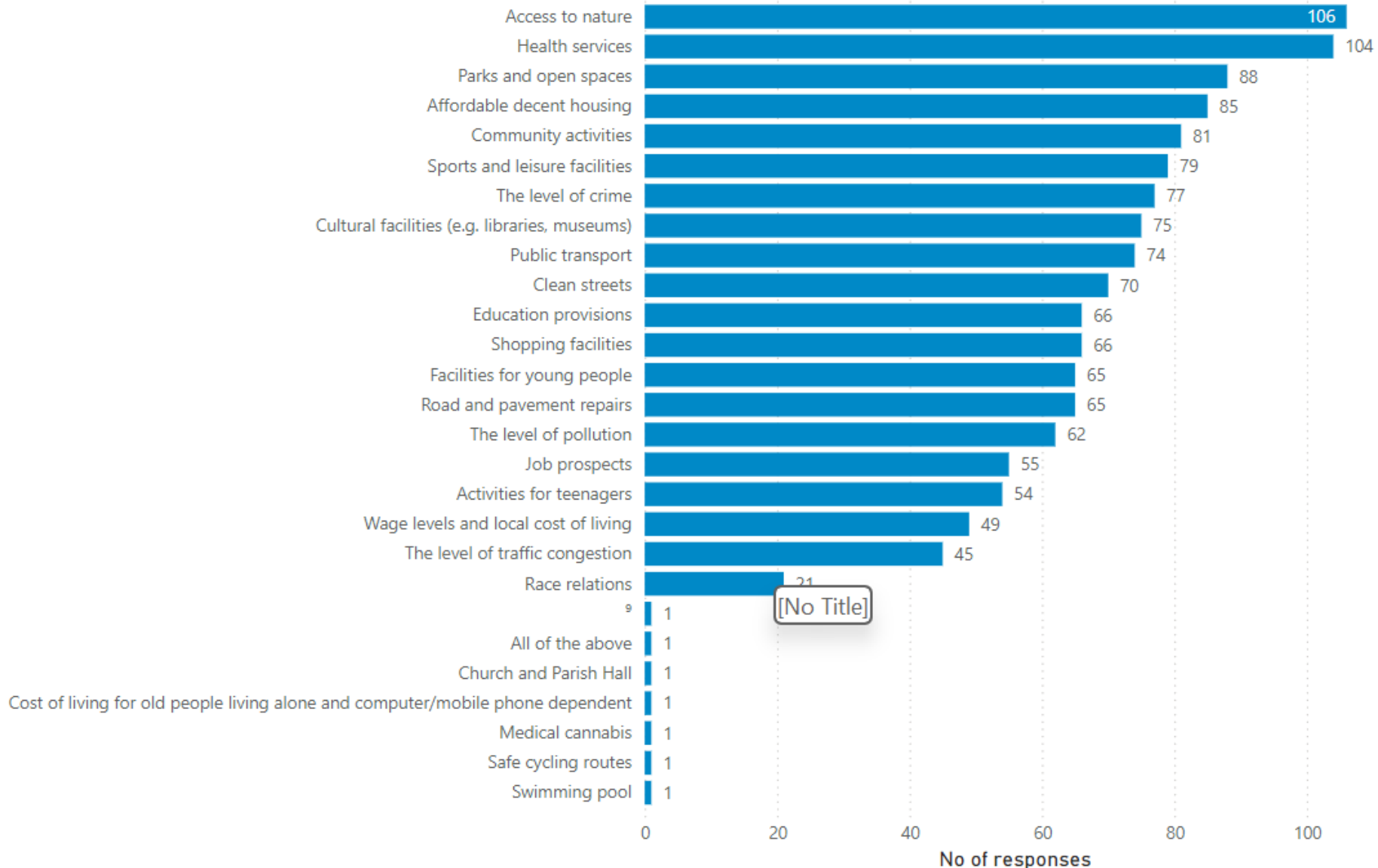

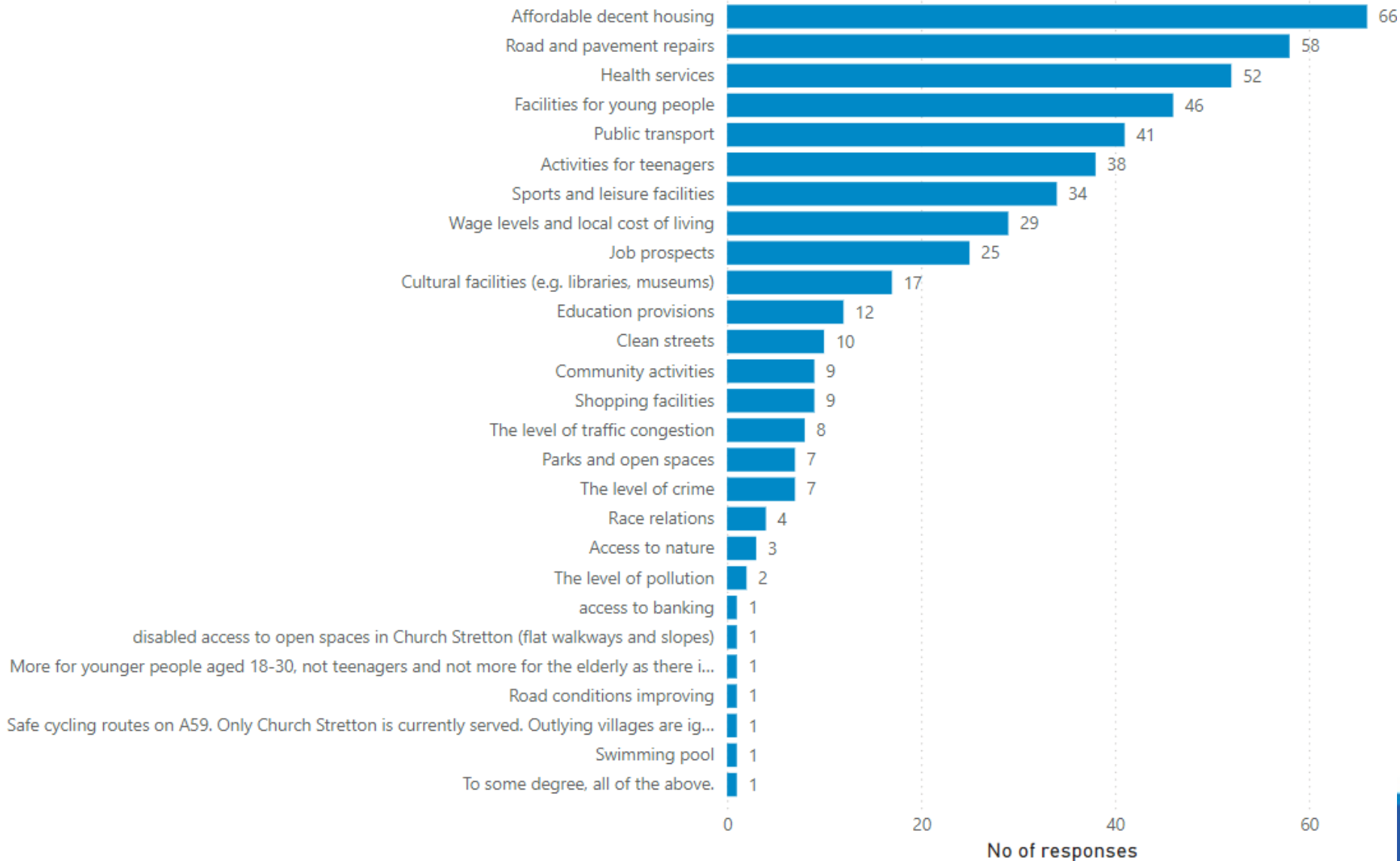


Thinking generally, which of the things below would you say are the most important in making somewhere a good place to live?

"Adult education and job opportunities are important to retain and support young families and people to stay in the area. They need decent affordable homes and access to community facilities "

"Energy saving at leisure centre especially at swimming pool eg solar panels, heat pumps"

"Keeping vital services open like Community Centres, Village Halls and Leisure Centres and Pools"

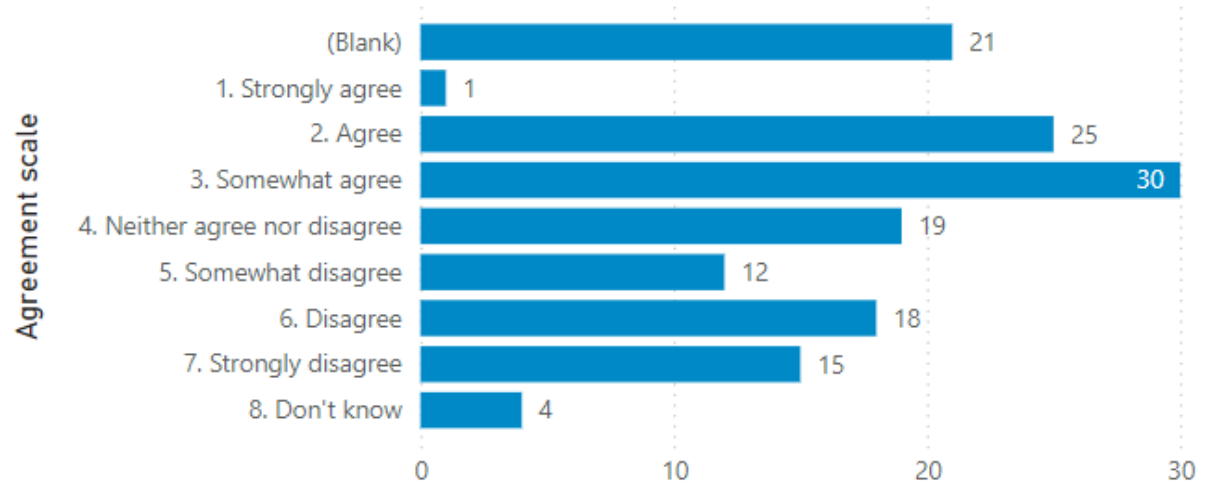
"My anxiety levels relate to family matters, not to the issues highlighted on the survey. Road repairs, particularly on local roads, are neglected, sometimes putting residents' safety at risk. Reports about this issue are routinely ignored. "

"Public toilets require improvements particularly those at public park allowing access at weekends would be more visitor and family friendly"

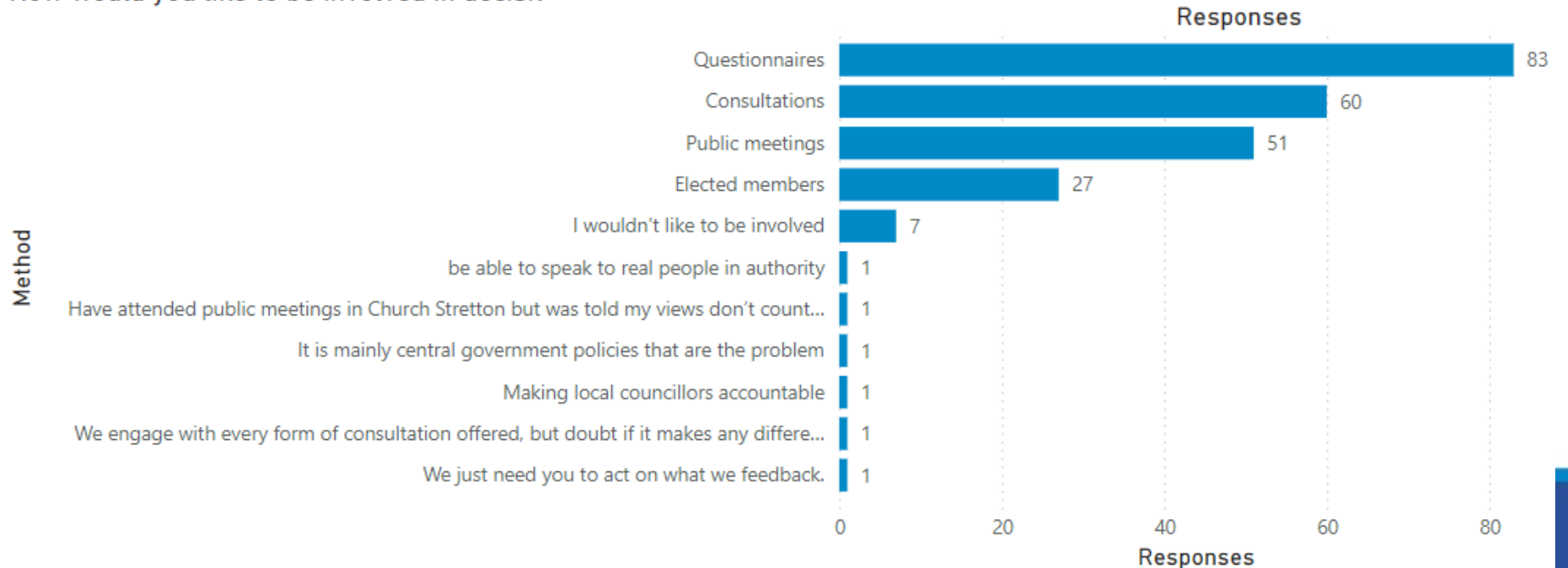
"The road surface in Ragleth Road is undermined by an underground stream during heavy rain. The underlying problem needs to be solved rather than just patching the surface "

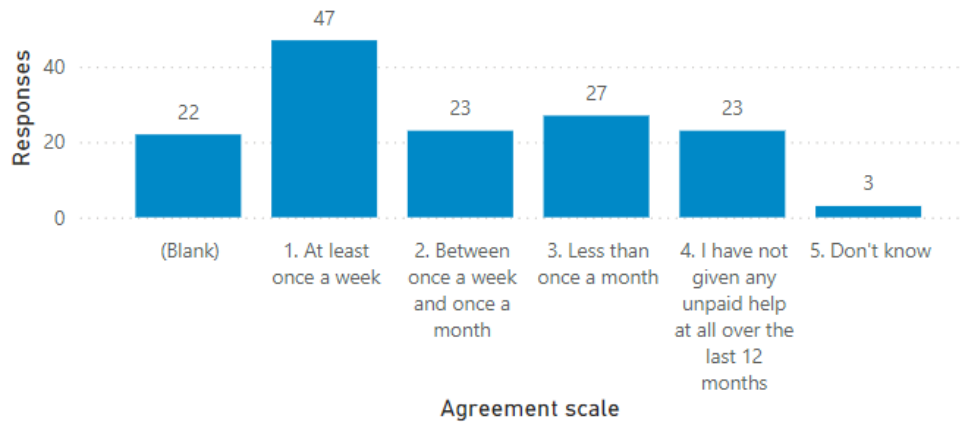
Do you agree or disagree that you can influence decisions affecting your local area?



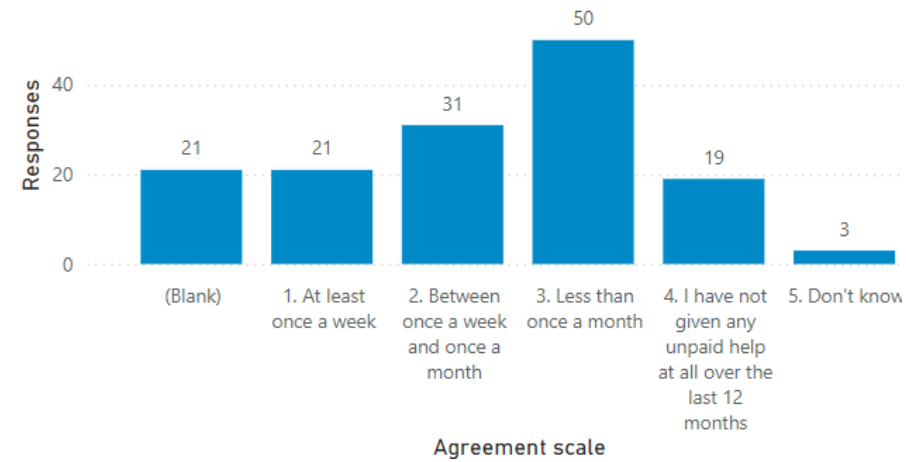
How would you like to be involved in decision making?



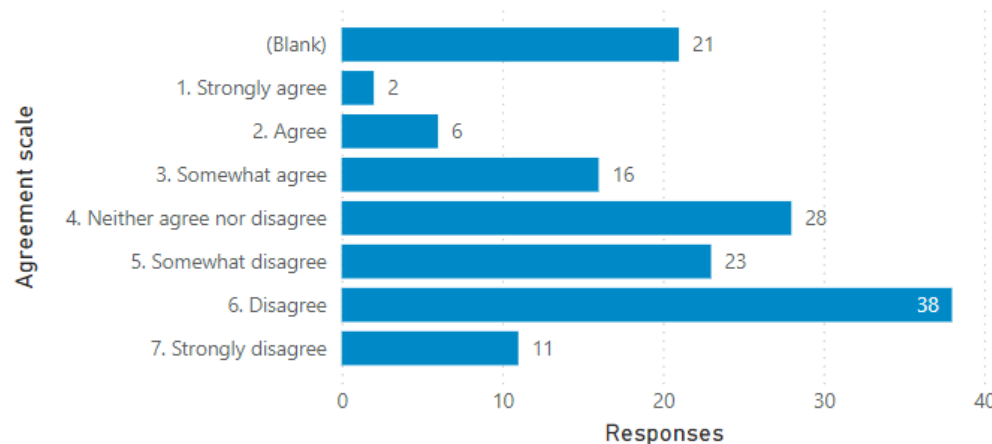
Overall, about how often over the last 12 months have you given unpaid help to any groups, clubs or organisations? Please only include work that is unpaid and not for your family.



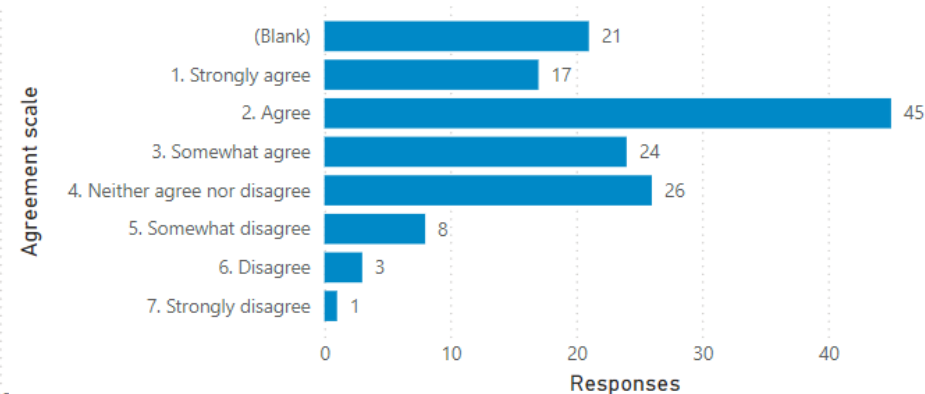
Overall, how often have you give unpaid help to a neighbour?



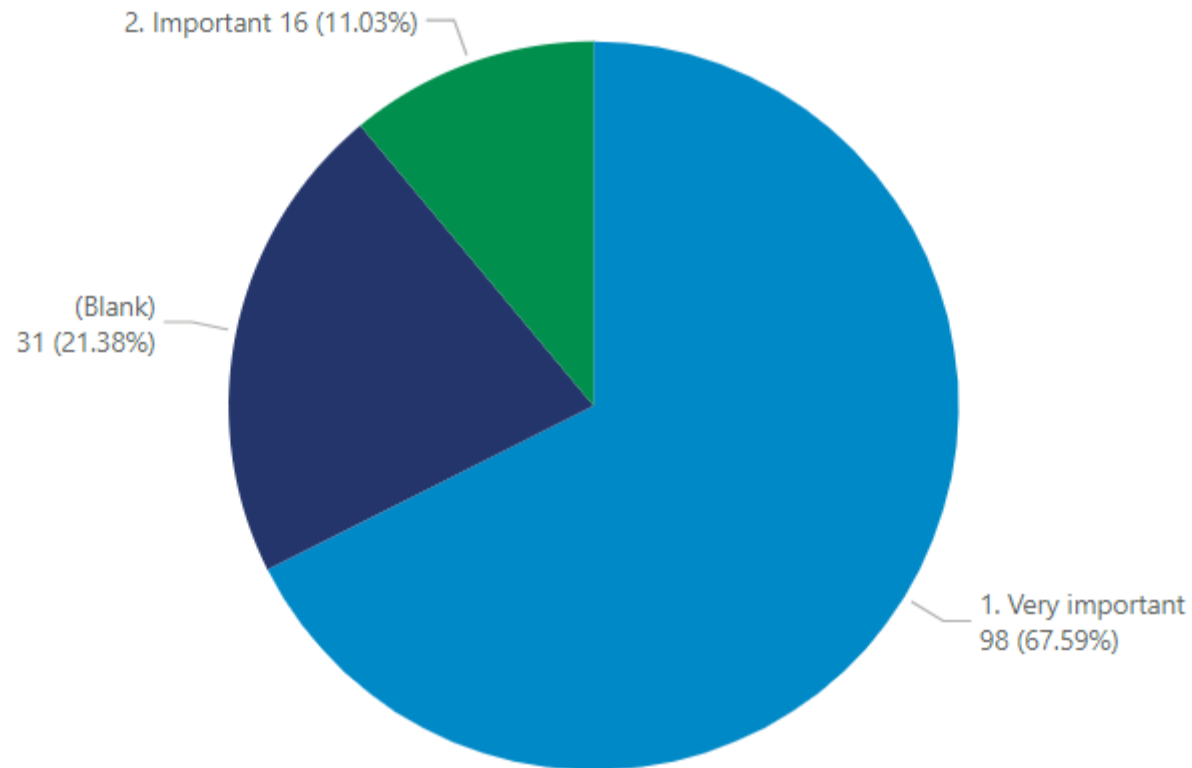

"CS medical centre staff are great and I appreciate the efforts they make trying to get a doctor's help to you, even when they are obviously swamped with work. The telephone appointments work well."

"Excellent dentist in church Stretton always accommodates myself and my young family when required. Local GP surgery employs some excellent staff nurses, doctors and admin."

"Good to have local medical centre but access to make appointments not always easy. Needs to be more clinics and call ups for general health checks. Also better access for mental health support. Would be good to have local dentist, optician, and pharmacy"

"Health services provided locally at the Mayfair/ health and wellbeing centre saves travel to shrewsbury/ telford Vaccines administered locally "

"We are fortunate to have an nhs dentist - currently Telford hospital has provided good breast clinic services, surgery and links to aftercare. I have had occasions to call an ambulance for a neighbour . The response was - you take her to hospital - you'll be waiting hours for an ambulance - the neighbour was 83 very frail and had lost a huge amount of blood. "

"More GPs, Closer involvement of nurses, physios etc. The Ambulance service is broken: some waiting times are unacceptable. Shropshire needs to get its act together and have one major DGH in or near Shrewsbury. "

"More 'in community' services closer to hand - lots of elderly people with lots of appointments having to rely on public transport to get to places like Shrewsbury, Ludlow & Telford is very difficult."

"There is no provision of GP care on Saturday. Currently there is a 6 week wait for a person to person appointment"

"Insufficient NHS dentist availability, lost my NHS status during Covid as I didn't visit dentist, no NHS spaces available to re-enrol."

"Shorter waiting time for doctors appointments. Cottage hospitals to free hospital beds. Open ambulance stations that have been closed so they dont have to travel so far to call outs. "

"Waiting lists having to pay privately to have a wisdom tooth out despite having NHS dentist. Young people mental health services non existent. Terrible maternity services awful experiences at RSH. Child waiting 8 months for physio appointment. "

"Would be nice for some extra support with mental health and for younger babies and infants ie-breastfeeding support group "

"Charities such as Mayfair pick up a lot of social care support but they are stretched "

"Church Stretton is well provided for but not the outlying villages and hamlets"

"Community support for vision impaired very good once accessed, but far too long waiting time to get access."

"Mayfair Community Centre is a life-saver"

"Mayfair is excellent. Private care and nursing homes are good for those who are able to pay for them"

"Maysi and other services offered by the Mayfair Centre"

"People working in these professions are generally very dedicated & supportive, this means a lot to those receiving the service."

"Accessible wardens at supported accommodation"

"Allow Carers more time per patient. To enable OT's to get on with their role rather than be bogged down in paper work and poor management decisions"

"it is hard to access social care support and to get accurate assessments to enable people to get support they need to make their lives easier. it is always a battle!"

"Many people outside of Church Stretton in rural areas do not know about available services. These are only publicised in Church Stretton"

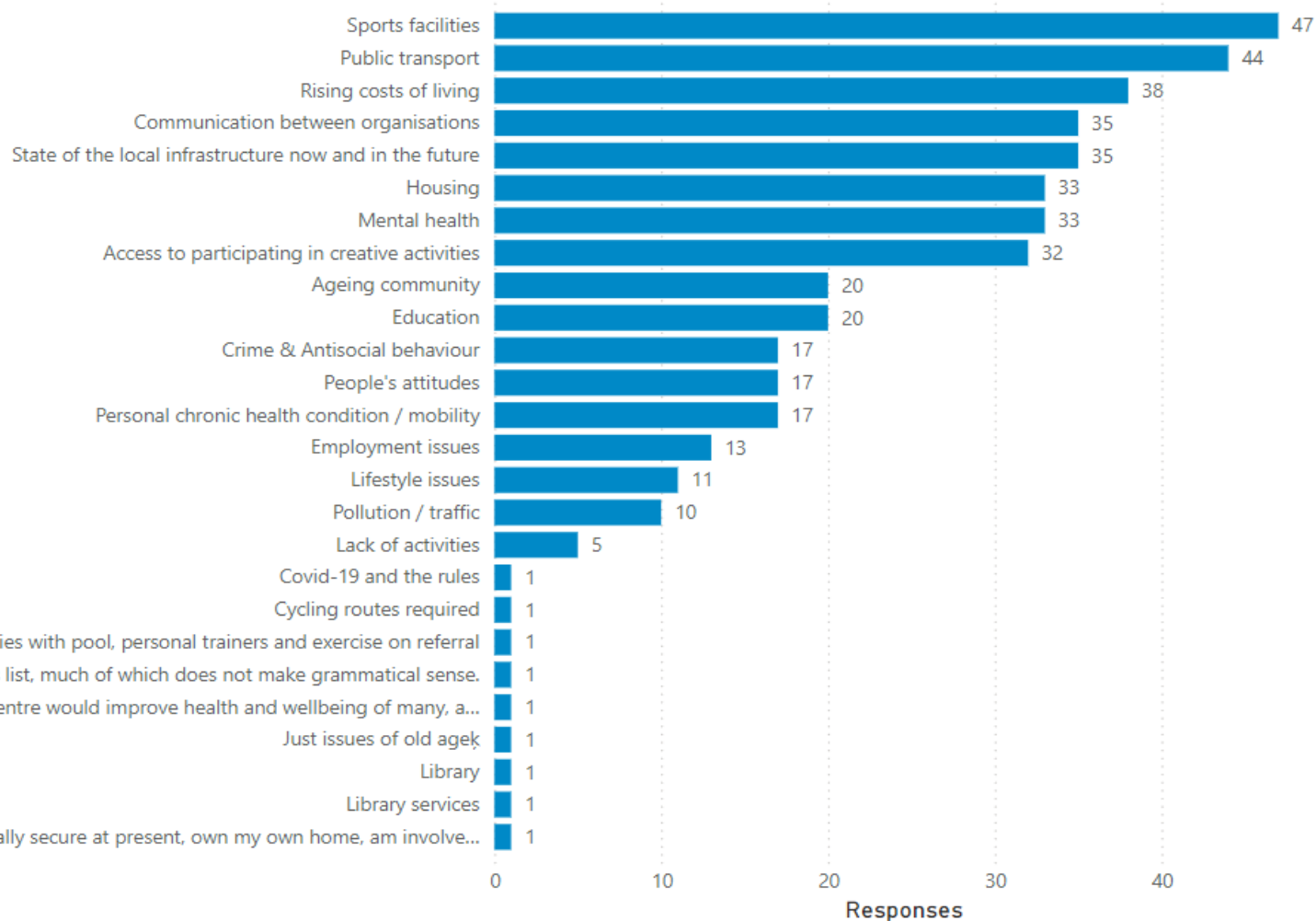
"More carers needed More support for mental health and addiction needed More housing support required "

"More rehabilitation Workers for the visually impaired Too many people waiting too long Affecting physical and mental health "

"Some of the workers within these professions are stretched, to breaking point. They often have to live a long distance away from their clients, because of lack of local affordable housing. This adds to their costs because of time & travel costs, & causes them further hardship & stress. This is not helpful to them or the clients they serve."

“Increase in use of facilities at local leisure centre would improve health and wellbeing of many, and in medium to long term reduce avoidable NHS resource use”

“These are personal responses. I am financially secure at present, own my own house, am involved in voluntary activities and have access to church, sports and creative activities should I choose to use them”

What do you think the biggest health issues are that affect you and your family?

"Access and signposting support for young people with additional needs. General health 'check up' clinics do not happen as they should which are good, preventable measures. Early stages of health issues are missed as a result."

"Complete lack of bus public transport during evenings and all day Sundays"

"I am 76 years of age with a fitness age of 38. I need to keep active and, because I live alone, I need the social aspect of fitness classes (I do 13/week), working out in the gym is a lonely, boring activity. I'm not on any medication and I want to keep it that way."

"Making access to healthcare easier and a decent pharmacy that doesn't run out of things. "

"Our health and wellbeing could be better if there were cheaper, low cost options in our local area. Food costs are very high locally due to only having 1 very expensive supermarket and the local businesses are also not writhing my families budget. I would like my children to access local activities but again struggle with costs "

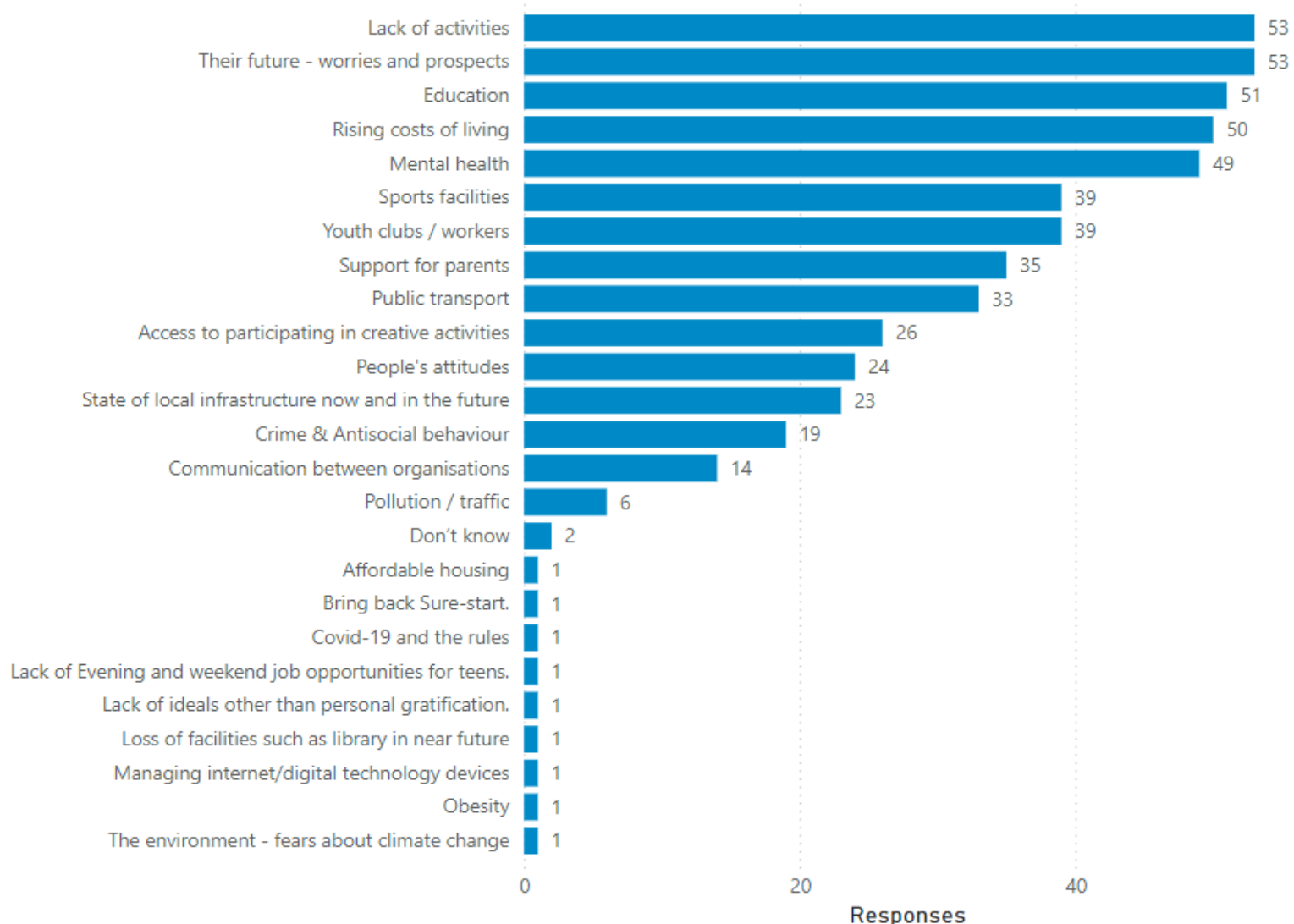
"These would be not having access to local facilities for sport and leisure so we can maintain our fitness for physical and mental health."

"Waiting times.... Having to wait for a mental health psychology appointment for my 18 year old son. 6 to 9 months waiting! Not good enough"

"Access to more activities at a affordable price, access to public transport, informative information about dangers of drugs and crime"

"At the moment, so many teenagers are suffering because of the aftermath of Covid. Anxiety, depression etc. There aren't enough services available"

"Being able to feel like they can be independent, opportunities to mix in non-educational settings and prospects i.e. how can they realistically stay in the area if they want to. "

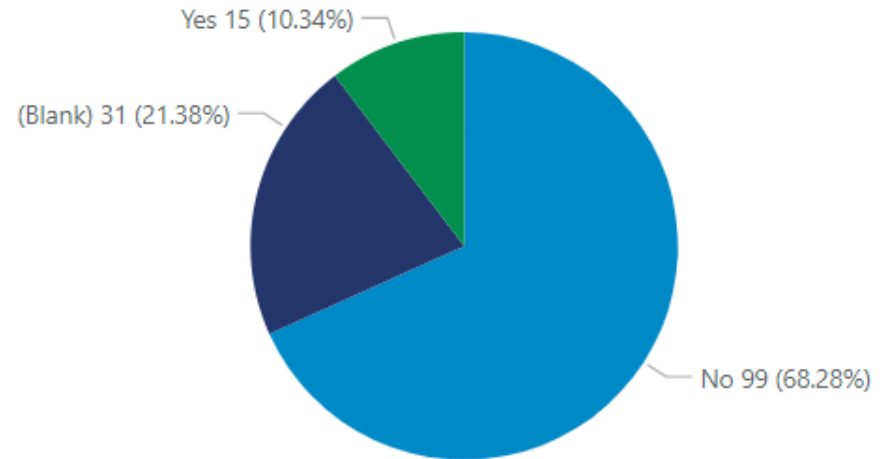
"Bullying in school (where it occurs); local transport (rural areas can lead to isolation) and lack of care for special education needs children and young people; "

"Listen to what they have to say about what they want supper with, and try to implement where possible, they then have ownership "

"Making them more cost effective for lower income families "

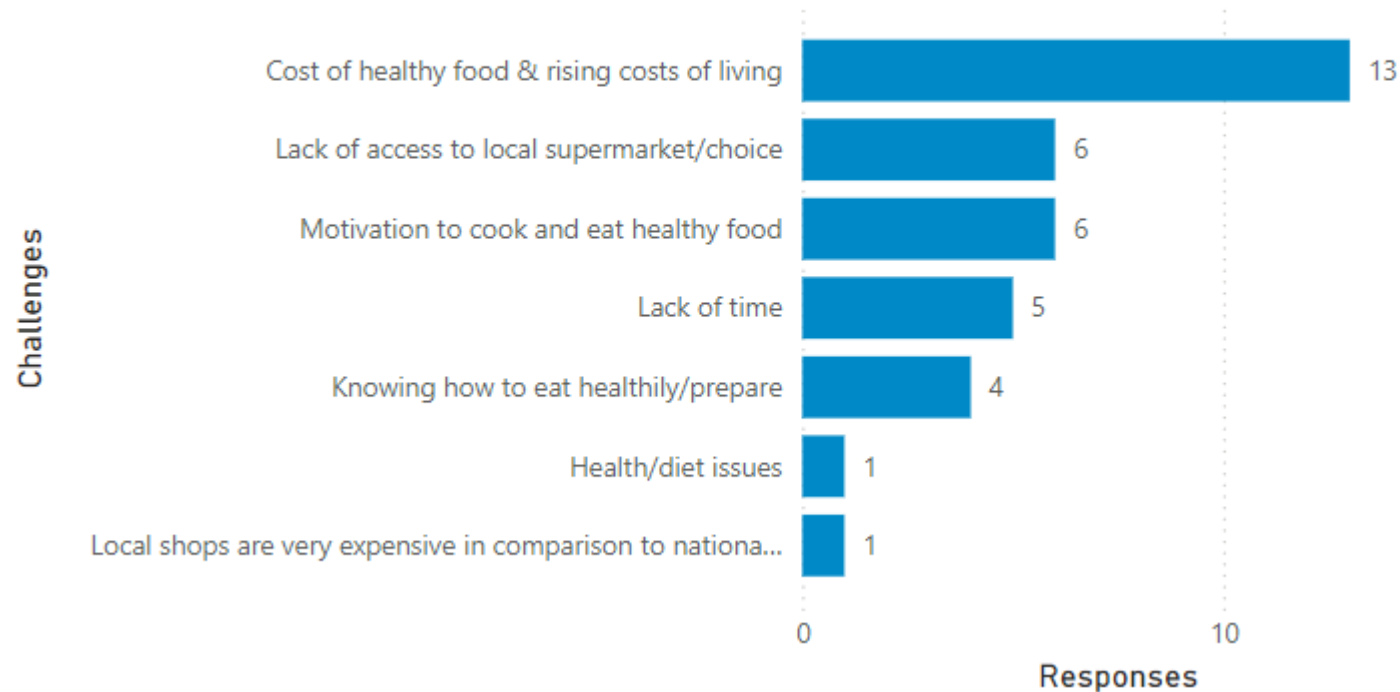
"More assistance to help young people into paid employment and also supported employment. Many young people with additional needs are capable to get paid work with a job coach initially but very limited opportunity. Many spend hours volunteering when these could / should be paid once they have shown they are capable. Prospective employees should be supported to enable them to gain such employment. "

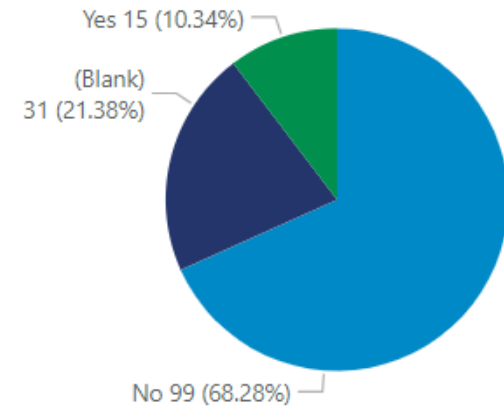


What are the challenges to eating healthy food?

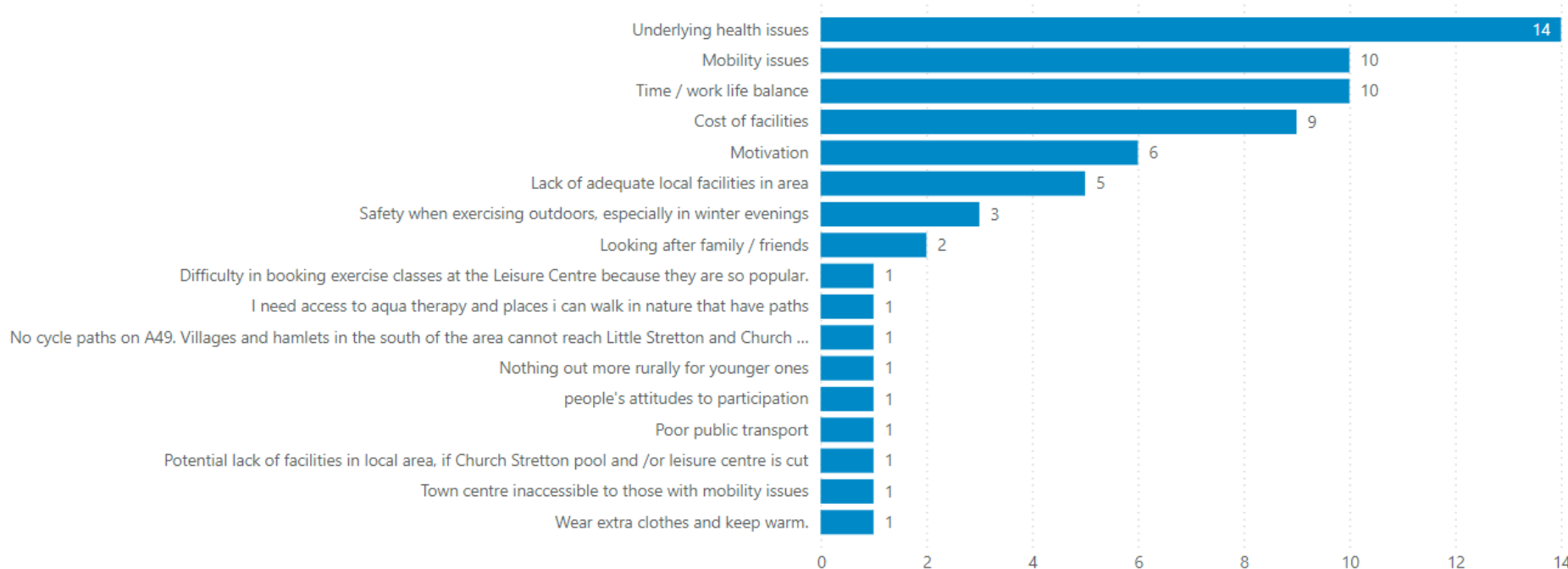
Are there challenges for you and your family in regard to being active in your daily life?

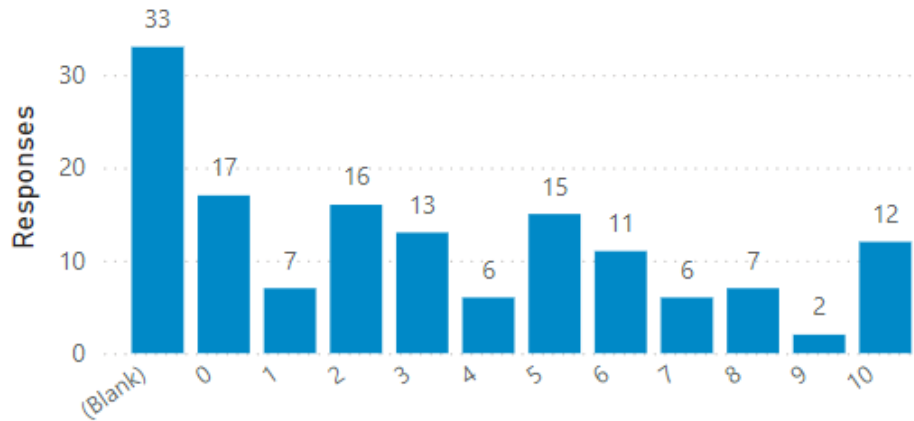

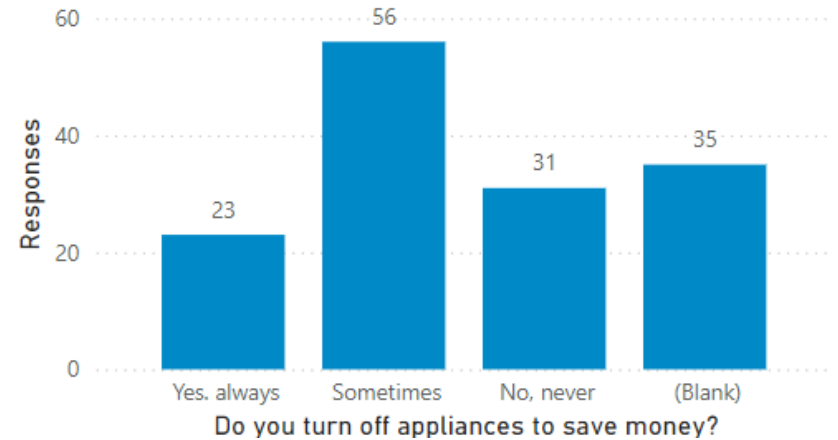

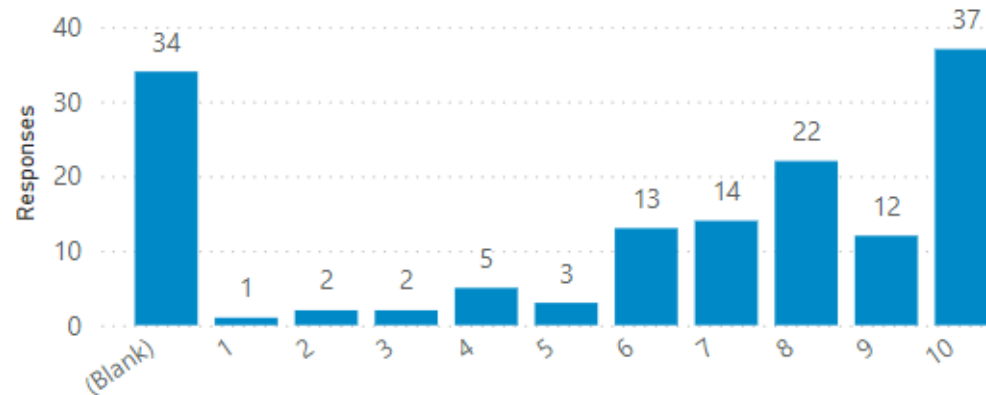

"I have some medical issues, yet have to wait weeks for an appointment at gp (not actually seen a gp for 7 years) but have to work 50 - 60 hours per week to provide for family, one child of which has many medical issues and is registered disabled"

"The residents of Church Stretton hoard all the facilities and ignore residents of villages and hamlets that form part of their administrative area. Committees are dominated by pensioners who ignore the needs of younger families and young people. All resources go to elderly wealthy white residents in Church Stretton. Those of us living in hamlets to the south are ignored and told move to Church Stretton then. Church Stretton has all the public money spent on it and in rural areas we have no facilities at all. Improve bridleways to aid rural residents to exercise. Install bike friendly gates on bridleways instead of stiles which prevent those of us with disabilities from exercising"

"Church Stretton's swimming pool means so much to me and my family but it needs refurbishing to make it at least more energy efficient, Also it needs more accessible facilities for full range of users. A cafe would be an attraction and generate income."

"Need for wheelchair accessible housing given increasing geriatric population"

"Used to use the Mayfair health walks , virtually every week. Now I can only cope with the easiest. A wide range of walks are available for those with / without mobility issues I love living here there is so much support (Mayfair) and things to do "
