### What is a Joint Strategic Needs Assessment?

Local Authorities and CCGs (now ICS) have a legal Statutory Duty to undertake a Joint Strategic Needs Assessment (JSNA), through the Health and Wellbeing Board.

To identify **current** and **future health and wellbeing needs** in the local population and identify strategic **priorities** to inform commissioning of services based on needs.

These priorities inform the **Health and Wellbeing Strategy** and **Integrated**Care Strategy as a basis for commissioning health and social care services
in Shropshire. We also believe they should support local partners / communities'
priorities.

In Shropshire, our JSNA takes three forms:

- Web based profiling Tool
- Thematic Needs Assessments e.g., pharmacy, drug and alcohol and children
- Place Based Needs Assessments





- The data metrics have been grouped together to give an overview of each place plan area





### Smoking at time of delivery

- Ellesmere had 152 deliveries between 2017/18 and 2021/22, which is the joint 3<sup>rd</sup> lowest of the 18 place plan areas.
- However, the rate of smoking (12.5%) was the 8th highest place plan area, significantly higher than Shropshire's (12.3%)





### **Survey Results**






#### Which of these housing situations applies to you?






#### Do you have any long-standing illness or disability?

"WE NEED NHS DENTISTS!!!!"


"There is no public transport in Welshampton. Roads are often flooded and the potholes make this very dangerous. Mobile library is not always reliable and is limited."

"There is a well known drug problem in Ellesmere which begs the question - if it is so well known, why is no one doing anything about it. Or if they are, why are the public not being consulted about it. Kids from the local private school come into town and act they own the place....but there is nothing for them to actually come into town for. You have to travel to Whitchurch or Oswestry for any services, job centre, Council services, social groups, which is fine if you drive, but if you don't, you can well feel stranded. The mere is beautiful but it gets so busy with hundreds of people in the summer, but it is the only outside space we have. I used to like to walk down by the canal but my balance has worsened since then and the tow path does not always feel flat/suitable."

"There needs to be a better system to access health services. Waiting lists are awful, and there is no preventative health programmes in place. Everything is reactive, and by the time you see someone, it is too late."

"I along with others run a food share for those in need amongst our community. This should not be necessary but we are serving at least 60 families a week"

"Council provided sports facilities need to be nearer and health care needs to be bigger and provide more as we need to travel without good public transport to get health appointments "











# Survey responses: Influence / involvement in decisions

Do you agree or disagree that you can influence decisions affecting your local area?




How would you like to be involved in decisions affecting your local area?





In your local area, would you agree that there's a problem with people not treating each other with respect and consideration?




To what extent do you agree or disagree that your local area is a place where people from different backgrounds get on well together?







### Tell us more about your *local health* services what works well

These are a summary of the main themes from the comment. Although most comments touched on several different themes

"Nothing to be honest ...apart from an excellent epilepsy nurse "

"Very good local GP's, especially if there is an urgent problem. We have 2 week referral for cancer - I experienced this and it was excellent"

"The local go surgery are generally very nice and have always managed to see me same day when I've been worried regarding my baby."

"I have recently changed G.P. to Plas ffynnon in Oswestry. Many of the villagers go to Chirk in Wales. I run the St. Martins volunteer car service .. . we take patients to Chirk, Wrexham, Shrewsbury hospitals and surgeries there is no assessable public transport to These major health centres from st, Martins."

"The Dr's are lovely. The nurses will see you quicker which helps."


"Oswestry has good services, but getting into Oswestry can be difficult. Good train links, but shouldn't have to get a train to everywhere."

## Tell us more about your local health services, what could be better

### Keywords

These are a summary of the main themes from the comment. Although most comments touched on several different themes

"We need more doctors or GPs who know about womens health. There is a demand for support groups in the SY4 postcode for those who stryggle with fertility and / or womens health and there is a severe lack of support."

"Hospital is quite far and in very poor shape (see latest A&E doc by Channel 4 based in Shrewsbury), absolutely insane that they're wanting to close Telford A&E to direct it to Shrewsbury when Shrewsbury is already struggling. Impossible to get an NHS dentist within reasonable walking or public transport distance. Health visitor has stopped responding to texts and hasn't confirmed when next visit is/was supposed to be. When I needed to get to hospital shortly after my c section, 111 told me an ambulance wouldn't be able to pick me up within 12 hours and it was quicker to get a friend who lives in Liverpool to drive me down, despite it being a potential emergency."


"There are no dentists taking on NHS patients at all - this has been the case for a number of years; our doctors' surgery is stretched so much it can take weeks/months to get an actual face to face appointment & treatment; Communications between hospitals & GP can be poor; too many people told to go to A&E rather than given a GP appointment."

"A community health centre should be replaced it closed 4 years ago."

"Better GP availability More NHS dentists School Nurses to actually be in schools Community health workers to relieve pressure on GPs Acknowledgement from NHS that not everyone can get to appointments easily NHS to stop sending letters with appointments - can they not call to arrange the appointment - perhaps there would be fewer missed appointments if people were consulted about the times instead of the appointment being made first "

"Shorter waiting list for appointments especially the doctors I usually have to wait between 6-8 weeks. As for dentists good luck finding an NHS one. The hospitals are overrun and ALL staff very underpaid. I struggle with money and paying all my bills. I have to use food bank otherwise I would have nothing at all to eat."







## Tell us more about your local social services – what works well

### These are a summary of the main themes from the comment. Although most comments touched on several different themes

"Helen Youens is the only person who actually does her job and props up the whole learning disabilities team"

"Early Help used to be available in the area, friend had a very positive experience with them "

"My husband has a carer daily. that works well. .community physio has been excellent .I am a retired nurse , I know my way around the health care services it has been a battle to get the services we need, people need more advocates . not everyone is articulate and communicative."

"Home visits for physio and mobility advice very good"

"Childrens Social Care is under funded but they do what they can. Early Help are seriously understaffed. Our friend had a Family Worker late last year, and she was amazing, but I have since heard that they no longer have these which is a real shame."



## Tell us more about your local social services – what could be better

### These are a summary of the main themes from the comment. Although most comments touched on several different themes

"Getting access to social care and assessments is a real issue. No CLEAR routes to care, costs and support. Lots of red tape when you are in crisis Need a citizen advice service and face to face guidance "

"Early Help no longer seems to be in operation, or they have changed how it can be accessed, a shame, early support seems the logical decision "

"Social services will only finance up to a certain amount . there is very little choice when it comes to respite unless you can afford to pay,"

"Social Care is very hard to get for the elderly, and very expensive to go private "

"Social Service assessments for children and adults seem to take a long time. We waited weeks for my Aunts and I felt it was very rushed."


"More staff needed and a higher rate of pay."





"Support for families who have a young serverly disabled person who has multiple health issues"

"Living alone - I'm ok now but if something happened I wonder how I would cope - you can only get friends to help so much "

"Rising costs of living for pensioners and isolation, access to activities, coping with paperwork of life and not having the capability to do online stuff as they age - mental health Young families on low income - creates mental health issues. Lack of infrastructure / doctors / dentists / home start for young families "

"dentistry. I have to pay monthly for dental treatment. Very difficult for my family to find a dentist."


"There is no early health intervention, no medical issues are actually investigated until it is already serious "

"Getting mental health help right away. The lists are to long for operations etc in the hospital. Having to wait 6-8 WEEKS for an appointment at your doctors."



#### These are a summary of the main themes from the comment. Although most comments touched on several different themes

"Support and counciling in a free and public setting for young children who are worried about their future. Support and education on smoking \*(particularly vaping) for those 17 and under."

"They need places and activities to access especially for 'young adults' there seems to be a lot for younger ages and then nothing. Communication between groups could be much better and old fashioned marketing for those that do exist"

"Parental support and account - currently too much pressure on schools, which do not have the facilities to deal work issues that are actually the responsibility of parents/carers."

"Future - apprenticeships - access to better work experience - easier transport to get to where work is early and late"

"Parenting skills like Homestart used to provide, not surestart but Homestart look it up they were brilliant but lost funding"

"We need safe spaces for teenagers to get together in an unstructured way, so that they can just hang out and play music without disapproving adults or the threat of drug dealers "


"it takes a long time to see someone about mental health but while you are waiting everyone expects you to just get on with everything "




These are a summary of the main themes from the comment, although most comments touched on several different themes

#### Main Theme









"Please, please can we have an NHS dentist in Ellesmere!!!"

"I was able to cope well on pension credit but I'm worried about my housing as my son I shared with; died unexpectedly so I'm in 3 bed rented. Could do with possibly 2 bed bungalow or flat with warden to feel secure and not too vulnerable, long list, I believe."

"Community police guarding against antisocial behaviour would be good given recent petty vandalism of community projects, and increased littering."

"Please try to increase public transport between Ellesmere and Shrewsbury. The 501 bus is limited to 5 journeys a day and there is no local taxi services, if I need to get from Cockshutt to Ellesmere I have to have a taxi from Shrewsbury which increases the cost by about £20.00 a journey. Extra buses on the 501 route would help a lot of rural communities situated between Shrewsbury and Ellesmere."

"Questionnaires like this are all well and good, but if nothing is done from them, they are pointless and a waste of time"

"Autism support is not good once you have left school "

"Just that Helen Morgan (my MP) is the only MP in my entire life that has done things for local people and I've only ever heard good things about her. Well Done Helen keep it up. "
