

What is this project all about?

This is a research project that runs between July 2017 and September 2019. We want to find out more about how children and young people are involved in decisions about their education. We will be talking to lots of different people that are involved in educational planning so that we can understand different people's experiences. Towards the end of the project we will write reports about what is working well, as well highlighting some of the difficulties that children, young people, families and professionals might face. Then we will make suggestions about how people can better support children and young people to participate in decisions about their education in the future.

Do I have to take part?

No. You do not have to take part in this. It is up to you to decide if you want to take part or not. Before you decide you may want to talk it through with other people that you trust. **Whatever you decide is OK.** Even if you say 'yes', you can stop at any time. You can stop without telling us why.
